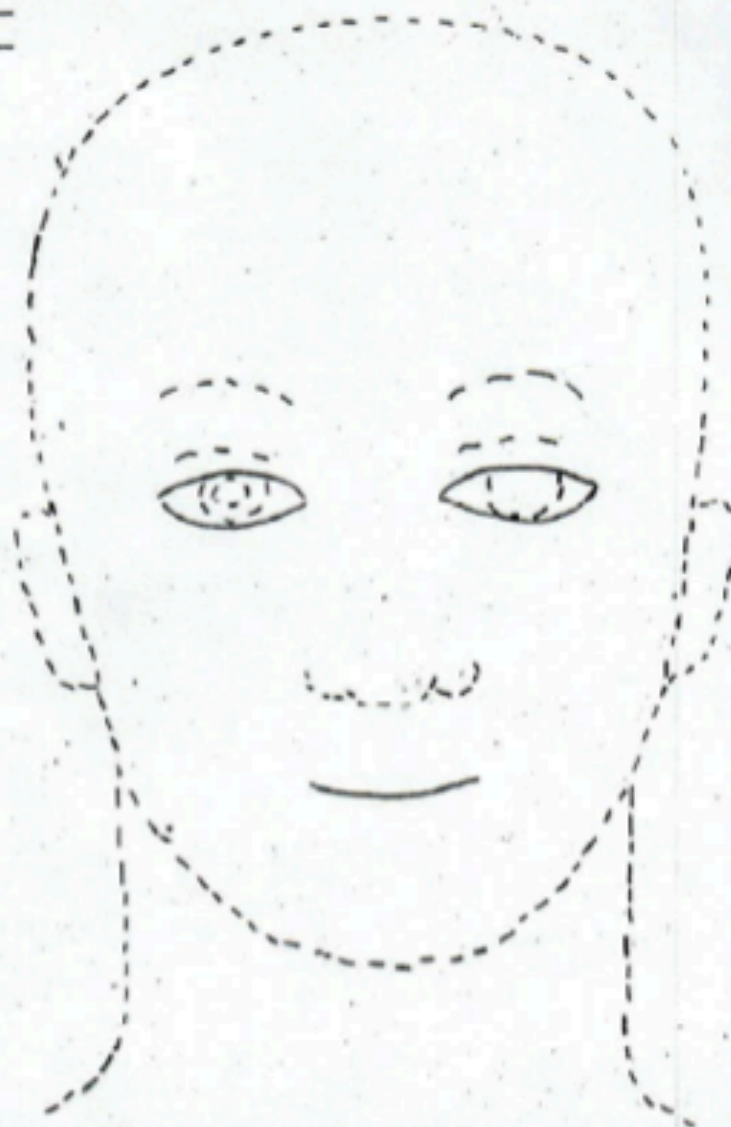

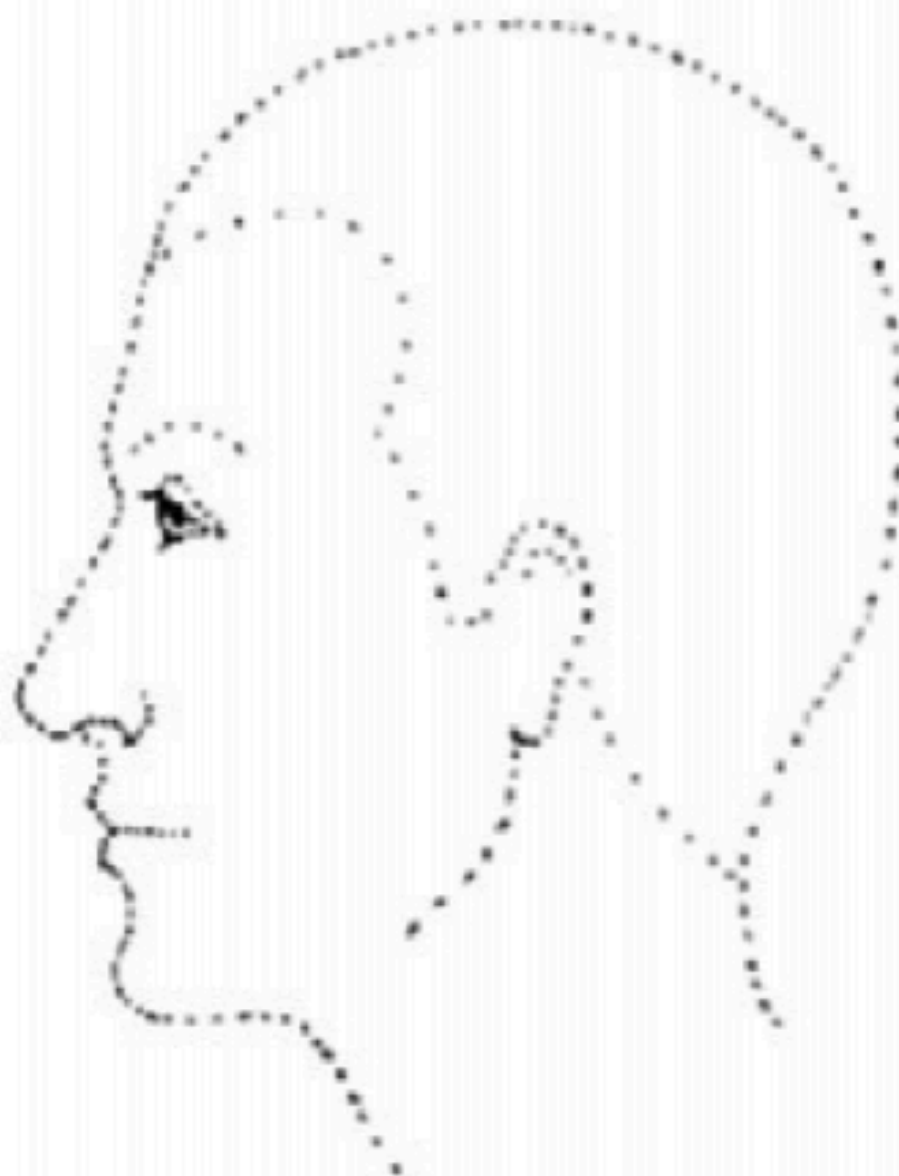

SIDE VIEW

Sketch using a soft lead pencil to allow for corrections and changes. Draw proper lines, brows, highlights, shadows, etc. on the chart, or place a piece of tracing paper over the chart, or use a separate sheet of paper.

Place front view and side view of character make up chart next to each other as you sketch.

Areas to Consider:

Face: old, young, fat, thin, oval, triangle, square
 Forehead: broad to narrow
 Eyebrows: bushy, thin, full, close together, far apart
 Eyes: close together, far apart, large, small, round, narrow
 Nose: size and shape, broad, thin, bulbous, crooked, straight
 Lips: full to thin, turned up, turned down, Cupid's bow
 Cheeks: full, sunken, rosy
 Chin: cleft, strong, weak, prominent, receding
 Complexion: sun burned, tan, sallow, indoor or outdoor, blemishes, birthmarks, "wrinkles," "crow's feet," lines
 Hair: color, style, head cover
 (Men: moustache, beard, sideburns)
