For online classes, all students are required to complete an online orientation. Students are expected to log in several times a week, check announcements and emails and complete assigned work.





Course Overview

<u>ECON 2302 – Principles of Microeconomics</u> presents an analysis of the behavior of individual economic agents, including consumer behavior and demand, producer behavior and supply, price and output decisions by firms under various market structures, factor markets, market failures, and international trade.

This is a core curriculum course.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

ECON 2302 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum and addresses the following core objectives which will be evaluated in this course through exams, homework assignments or written work.

- 1. <u>Critical Thinking Skills</u> (CT): To include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- 2. <u>Communication Skills</u> (COM): To include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- 3. <u>Empirical and Quantitative Skills</u> (EQS): To include the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.
- 4. <u>Social Responsibility</u> (SR): To include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national and global communities.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs)

Upon completion of ECON 2302, the student will be able to:

- 1. Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision-making.
- 2. Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
- 3. Summarize the law of diminishing marginal utility; describe the process of utility maximization
- 4. Calculate supply and demand elasticities, identify the determinants of price elasticity of demand and supply, and demonstrate the relationship between elasticity and total revenue.
- 5. Describe the production function and the Law of Diminishing Marginal Productivity; calculate and graph short-run and long-run costs of production
- 6. Identify the four market structures by characteristics; calculate and graph the profit maximizing price and quantity in the output markets by use of marginal analysis.
- 7. Determine the profit maximizing price and quantity of resources in factor markets under perfect and imperfect competition by use of marginal analysis
- 8. Describe governmental efforts to address market failure such as monopoly power, externalities, and public goods

Student Success

The assignments provided will help you use your study hours wisely. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of the following:

Assignments, Exams, and Activities

Exams

There will be 2 midterm exams which are administered online. Each exam must be completed by the specified due date (consult the course calendar on Canvas for due dates). Exams are in addition to the weekly homework quizzes that are available online for each chapter. Each of the two exams will have 40 questions from the relevant material and will account for 10% of the overall grade. A third exam period is scheduled at the end of the semester to provide you with the opportunity to make-up a missed exam. The makeup must be taken in person and is available to all students who wish to make-up an exam. The makeup for a missed exam will be over the material covered for that exam and the grade will replace the zero earned on the missed exam. For students who want to make-up an exam that was not missed, the makeup will replace the corresponding exam only if the grade earned is higher than the original grade.

Final Exam

The final exam must be taken in person at the time specified in the official final exam calendar. Students may elect to take a comprehensive third exam in lieu of the final exam on the make-up date. Students who elect to take a comprehensive third exam will not be allowed to take the final exam.

The final exam will account for 40% of the overall grade. It will contain 60 multiple choice questions and you can bring single sided 8.5X11 sheet of paper written in normal handwriting to consult during the final exam. The paper is subject to instructor approval.

Final exam makeups are not possible due to the tight deadlines for the course grades. Hence, if you miss the final exam you will receive a grade of zero and that will be the end of the story.

Other Assignments

Inquisitive: Inquisitive assignments must be accessed through Canvas. Inquisitive assignments are provided by the publisher and you must be registered for the e-book to access them. It is to your advantage to complete these assignments in a timely manner. The assignment can continue until you achieve a score of 100 which means that you can guarantee yourself 30% of the course by dedicating the time required to complete these assignments. Of course, the process will be much faster if you study the material before starting.

Homework Quizzes: You are expected to completely chapter homework quizzes. These are quizzes that are worth between 12 and 16 points each. The grade on the quizzes is weighted by the number of questions on each quiz. I.e. The grade is calculated by adding up the total points earned on the quizzes and divided by the total number of points available. You are only allowed one attempt per quiz. So, take the quizzes after all reading and inquisitive assignments are completed. The quizzes will account for a total of 10% of the overall grade

Missed Assignments

Instructors may be willing to consult with you for make-up assignments, but it is your responsibility to contact the instructor.

Make-up exams for missed exams and exam retakes to improve grades will be administered on the last lecture day of the semester t the scheduled class time. No other make-ups or retakes can be possible

Academic Integrity

Students are expected to complete all graded work on their own. You may consult the textbook and your notes during the homework quizzes and online exam. You are not permitted to consult with third parties including other students, parents, friends, google or other web sources.

During the final exam you are allowed one single sided sheet of paper on which you may write anything in normal handwriting. The sheet will require my approval prior to the start of the exam. That is the only resource you will have available to consult during the final exam.

Any student caught not following the above guidelines will be assigned a grade of zero for the activity on which the violation occurred. Multiple violations (2 or more) will result in a grade of "F" in the course.

Attendance Procedures

If a student does not attend class by the Official Day of Record, they will be dropped automatically by the registrar for non-attendance.

For online students, participation (as defined by your instructor) is necessary to show attendance.

Class attendance is monitored daily. Although it is your responsibility to drop a course, the instructor has the authority to drop you for excessive absences. You may be dropped from a course after accumulating absences in excess of 12.5 percent of the total hours of instruction (lecture and lab). For example:

For a 3 credit-hour lecture class meeting 3 hours per week (48 hours of instruction), you can be dropped after 6 hours of absence.

Administrative drops are at the discretion of the instructor.

Failure to withdraw officially can result in a grade of "F" or "Fx" in the course.

I expect you to be in-class on time every lecture. Attendance records will be taken at the beginning of each lecture. Students who are present at that time will receive 2 points for attendance. Students who come into the class less than 20 minutes after the start time will receive 1 attendance point and students who come more than 20 minutes late will receive zero attendance points. Students who miss class will lose one attendance point.

At the end of the semester, the 5 students with the top attendance points will receive 5, 4, 3,2, 1 bonus points on the final exam respectively. Ties are resolved based on inquisitive scores first, if the tie continues, the homework quizzes are used to break the tie, the third criteria for breaking a tie will be the 2 exams, If the tie should continue after all three tie-breakers are attempted, then both students will receive the lower bonus.

Student Conduct

You are expected to maintain professional behavior in the class. Professional behavior means that your participation in the class must be meaningful, that you will not belittle or degrade other students and be willing to accept others point of view. If you do not agree with someone and wish to express your views, then you must do so in a respectful and thoughtful manner. Harassing behavior will not be tolerated and will be referred to campus administration for further punitive actions.

Fractional grades on any graded activity will be rounded up to the next whole number. On the homework quizzes the total of the quizzes is what matters and not the individual quiz. Inquisitive, homework quizzes and exams that are missed must be treated as zeros when calculating averages.
