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Course Description

ANTH2351

Key concepts, methods and theory in the study of cultural diversity, social institutions, linguistics, and culture change among world peoples. (ACGM)

<u>ANTH2351</u>

This course focuses on culture, the ways people live and give meaning, form and organization to their lives as they adapt to various environments and conditions both in and beyond the borders of the U.S. Study of the descriptions and analysis of cultural diversity provide the basis for evaluating cultural components of everyday life including recognition of ethnocentrism, intercultural communication and understanding local and 'global' culture in a multicultural and transforming world. Transfer Information

Cultural Anthropology (ANTH2351) is a fully accredited university course with transferable credit. As an elective in the Houston Community College academic Degree Core, it transfers as a Social Science OR Cross-Cultural Core Course. Course Goal

To provide students with the most reliable knowledge about basic anthropology and an understanding of how that knowledge was gained.

Instructional Methods

This lecture course meets 2 times weekly. Preparation and active participation in class are essential to success. Class meetings include a combination of lectures, class exercises, discussion, viewing and analysis of films. This is a ****Web***Enhanced Course: this* means there is a course website in EagleOnline 2.0. <u>Students are required to log in to the web site regularly</u> for the course syllabus, announcements, "handouts" and assignments, and an email communication for students and instructor. *Sign in with your EagleOnline 2.0 login user ID - this* your HCC User ID (sometimes referred to as the "W" number). All HCC students have a unique User ID. The default student password is "distance." Students will be prompted to change their password after the first login. The course is: ANTH 2351 <u>CRN77029</u>. - 1. Distinguish the subfields of study within anthropology.
- 2. Evaluate human cultural variation over time and space.
- 3. Recognize ethnography and participant observation as the hallmark methods used by cultural anthropologists to build systematic and comparative knowledge of human cultures known as "ethnology".
- 4. Describe key elements of human language and evaluate language in human cultures and behaviors.
- 5. Illustrate how anthropological methods and theory can be applied to everyday life.

Learning objectives

After successfully completing the course, students should be able to:

1. Describe the history, subdisciplines, and characteristics of anthropology, including its holistic perspective, comparative view, and focus on culture.

2. Compare and contrast anthropology with the other social and biological sciences.

3. Discuss the concept of culture and its major characteristics from an anthropological perspective.

4. Identify the underlying similarities as well as the wide range of variability of human cultures as valid approaches to universal human challenges, and relate this to student's personal experience.

5. Describe anthropological fieldwork methodologies, emphasizing participant observation, interviewing strategies, and related ethical issues.

6. Describe the component parts of culture and their integration including: economic systems, modes of subsistence, marriage and kinship, social organization, political systems, language, religion, and art.

7. Describe how anthropological theories and methods can contribute to the development of intercultural understanding and appreciation of contemporary social issues and relate this to personal experience.

8. Critically comment on some of the ethical issues that confront human societies and how anthropology addresses those issues.

9. Describe the processes of globalization and the ways they shape, and are shaped by, different aspects of culture in human communities throughout the world.

10. Have had experience and developed skills in use of the computer, Internet and library resources developed for use in anthropological research.

11. Have expanded intellectual competencies including reading, writing, speaking, listening, critical thinking and computer literacy.

<u>Attendanc</u>e

Attendance = being present in class for the full class period. <u>Arrive for class on time!</u> There is an attendance penalty for habitual tardiness. In cases of borderline grades, attendance in class is particularly important. Students are expected to attend and will be evaluated for class participation. According to HCC policy, in a 3-credit course, students may be dropped after 6 hours (4 classes) of absence.
