COURSE OVERVIEW

Program Student Learning Outcomes (PSLOs) for the Biology Discipline

- 1. Will display an understanding of biological systems and evolutionary processes spanning all ranges of biological complexity, including atoms, molecules, genes, cells, and organisms.
- 2. Will integrate factual and conceptual information into an understanding of scientific data by written, oral and/or visual communication. (This may include successful completion of a course-specific research project or a case study module).
- **3.** Will demonstrate proficiency and safe practices in the use of laboratory equipment and basic laboratory techniques.
- **4.** Will apply principles of the scientific method to problems in biology in the collection, recording, quantitative measurement, analysis and reporting of scientific data.

Course Description and Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs)

Anatomy and Physiology I is the first part of a two course sequence. It is a study of the structure and function of the human body including cells, tissues and organs of the following systems: integumentary, skeletal, muscular, nervous and special senses. The lab provides a hands-on learning experience for exploration of human system components and basic physiology. Emphasis is on interrelationships among systems and regulation of physiological functions involved in maintaining homeostasis.

Completion of the specific course Student Learning Outcomes listed below does NOT and will NOT guarantee the student any specific final course grade at the end of the semester!

- Use anatomical terminology to identify and describe locations of major organs of each system covered.
- Explain interrelationships among molecular, cellular, tissue, and organ functions in each system.
- Describe the interdependency and interactions of the systems.
- Explain contributions of organs and systems to the maintenance of homeostasis.
- Identify causes and effects of homeostatic imbalances.
- Describe modern technology and tools used to study anatomy and physiology.

INSTRUCTOR GUIDELINES AND POLICIES

Attendance: Attendance is mandated by the state. You are expected to attend the entirety of the scheduled lecture and lab classes. You are also responsible for materials covered during your absences. Instructors may be willing to consult with you for make-up assignments, but it is your responsibility to contact the instructor. Class attendance is monitored daily. Although it is your responsibility to drop a

course for nonattendance, the instructor has the authority to drop you for excessive absences. You may be dropped from a course after accumulating absences in excess of 12.5 percent of the total hours of instruction (lecture and lab). For example:

- For a 3 credit-hour lecture class meeting 3 hours per week (48 hours of instruction), you can be dropped after 6 hours of absence.
- Departments and programs governed by accreditation or certification standards may have different attendance policies. Administrative drops are at the discretion of the instructor. Failure to withdraw officially can result in a grade of "F" or "FX" in the course.

<u>Collusion</u> mean the unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing written work offered for credit. Possible punishments for academic dishonesty may include a grade of 0 or F in the particular assignment, failure in the course, and/or recommendation for probation or dismissal from the College

HCC Policy Statements

Class Attendance - It is important that you come to class! Attending class regularly is the best way to succeed in this class. Research has shown that the single most important factor in student success is attendance. Simply put, going to class greatly increases your ability to succeed. You are expected to attend all lecture and labs regularly. You are responsible for materials covered during your absences. Class attendance is checked daily. Although it is your responsibility to drop a course for nonattendance, the instructor has the authority to drop you for excessive absences.

If you are not attending class, you are not learning the information. As the information that is discussed in class is important for your career, students may be dropped from a course after accumulating absences in excess of 12.5% hours of instruction. The six hours of class time would include any total classes missed or for excessive tardiness or leaving class early.

LECTURE

Grades will be based on: **four-lecture exams, daily evaluation, presentation/reports and 2 final exams** (mandatory).

- a. six-lecture exams, 100 points exams that may be a combination of short answer, fill in the blank, multiple choice and true/false. No makeup exams will be given unless the students can provide signed documented evidence. You are advised to contact the course instructor before or the day of the missed class. Makeup exams will be essay in format.
- **b. 2-quizzes.** Only materials covered in the lecture will be on the quiz and will total **200** points. No makeup quizzes will be given *unless* the students can provide signed documented evidence. You are advised to contact the course instructor **before or the day of the missed class.**
- **c. daily evaluation** will comprise of the students' participation in the class, late-coming, absenteeism and moreover classroom ethics and his interest during lectures and worth **100** points. Daily evaluation average is obtained by averaging the grades on all daily reports. Attendance will be taken daily.
- **d. presentation/report:** Each student will make a presentation to the class on a chosen scientific topic. The presentation will be near the end of the semester and worth **100** points. All students **must** be present on the day of class presentation.
- **e. final departmental exams are mandatory** and worth **100** points. The final exam will consist of multiple choice, matching and true/false. It will cover all lecture material.

<u>LAB</u>

Grades will be based on: four-lab exams, 2-quizzes and daily evaluation.

- **b. four-lab exams, 4-100** points exams. No makeup exams will be given *unless* the students can provide signed documented evidence. You are advised to contact the course instructor **before or the day of the missed class.** Makeup exams will be essay in format.
- **c. 2-quizzes.** Only materials covered in the lab will be on the quiz and will total **200** points. They will consist of terminology, dissections, lab experiment results and procedure. No makeup quizzes will be given *unless* the students can provide signed documented evidence. You are advised to contact the course instructor **before or the day of the missed class.**
- **d. daily evaluation** will comprise of the students' participation in the class, late-coming, absenteeism and moreover classroom ethics and his interest during lectures and worth **100** points. Daily evaluation average is obtained by averaging the grades on all daily reports. Attendance will be taken daily.

IP (In Progress) is given only in certain developmental courses. The student must re-enroll to receive credit. COM (Completed) is given in non-credit and continuing education courses. To compute grade point average (GPA), divide the total grade points by the total number of semester hours attempted. The grades "IP," "COM" and "I" do not affect GPA.

REPEATING COURSES (THREE-PEAT RULE)

As a result of recent Texas legislative changes, please be advised that HCC is charging additional tuition for students who enroll in the same class three or more times at HCC. While it is the hope of HCC that students will be successful in their first attempt at classes, we realize that life demands, academic struggles, and other issues may result in students needing to take the same class more than once. Speaking with an advisor will help you develop student success skills, improving your overall academic performance. If a student repeats a course in which a grade (A-F) has been received, the highest grade received at HCC is the permanent grade for the course and will be used in computing the GPA. All grades earned in a given course will be reflected on the transcript. Other colleges may compute the GPA differently than HCC.

COURSE WITHDRAWALS (6-Drop Rule)

Students must withdraw by the withdrawal deadline in order to receive a "W" on a transcript. Final withdrawal deadlines vary each semester and/or depending on class length, please visit the online Academic Calendar, any HCC Registration Office, or any HCC advisor to determine class withdrawal deadlines.

Be certain you understand HCC policies about dropping a course and consult with a counselor/advisor to determine if withdrawing is in your best interest. It is your responsibility to withdraw officially from a class and prevent an "F" from appearing on your transcript. Senate Bill 1231 limits the number of W's a student can have to 6 classes over the course of their entire academic career. This policy is effective for students entering higher education for the first time in fall 2007 and subsequent terms. Withdrawals accumulated at any other Texas public higher education institution count toward the 6 course total. Withdrawals for certain circumstances beyond the students control may not be counted toward the 6-drop limit. In addition, withdrawing from a course may impact your financial aid award or eligibility. Contact the Financial Aid Office or website to learn more about the impact of withdrawing on financial aid.
