Textbook: Destination2 - Grammar and Writing for Academic Success

Course Description

This course is a continuation of ENGL 0346, and focuses more on advance grammar and essay writing.

Prerequisites

A satisfactory score on the CELSA Test or completion of ENGL 0346- An advanced course in English grammar and composition designed to help the foreign student who already has some elementary skill in English grammar and composition.

Course Goal

- To improve students communication through our program.
- To become fluent and proficient in English.

Course Requirements

Students in ENGL 0347 must complete <u>seven essays</u> including a midterm and final essay, journal assignments, and homework assignment. Final grades are determined by averaging the total of each area listed next:

- 20% Participation / Attendance.
- 30% Assignments.
- 20% Midterm Exam (Week Eight).

GRADING SCALE:

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90-100 = A.
80-89 = B.
70-79 = C.
69-60 = D.
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59 and Below = F

ATTENDANCE: Texas State Law requires a 87.5% minimum attendance for college course. Students must not be absent for more than 12.5% of the course of 8 hours, or 4 classes meeting. In the event that a student exceeds the 8 hours of absence, then the Professor will submit an administrative drop form at the time the student become eligible to be dropped.

TARDIES: This class begins promptly at 12:30 pm. A tardy will be recorded if a student comes to class after 12:30 pm. Excessive tardiness, either individual or as a class, are interruptions of instruction. Official tardy count is recorded as follow: 2 tardiness (or early leaves) count as one class absence. If the student is gone for more than 15 minutes, then the student is considered as absent.

Class attendance equals class success.
