Course Overview

This stand-alone course is an interdisciplinary survey of cultures focusing on the philosophical and aesthetic factors in human values with an emphasis on the historical development of the individual and society and the need to create.

Student Success

Assignments, Exams, and Activities

Written Assignment

In Humanities 1301, you will complete three (3) out-of-class projects. In order to be accepted, each project must be submitted electronically to Eagle Online. You must format these reports according to MLA manuscript guidelines (see the learning web for more information).

<u>Self-Survey Visual Aid</u>: You will collect and analyze the body of knowledge that has been passed down to you from other members of your selected group. For this assignment, you may not conduct any outside research: instead, you should rely solely on your memory to describe and analyze the custom, tradition, and/ or ritual that define this particular group. SLOs 1, 2

<u>Individual Report and Rationale on a Virtual Museum Visit:</u> You will visit a museum virtually and then write a reflection about your experiences there. The report and rationale will involve originality of thought, and adhere to MLA format. SLOs 1, 2 and 4

<u>Individual Weblog and Rationale:</u> Throughout the semester, you will critically reflect on your encounters with Humanities topics discussed in our textbook, which will culminate in a rationale explaining how you have arrived at a deeper understanding of Humanities and its role in your day-to-day life. CSLOs 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5

All of these assignments will be discussed at length in our online class during the semester. Although I will provide handouts that delineate the requirements and grading criteria for these tasks, I expect you to keep up with assigned readings and to take notes while paying attention in class.

To potentially pass this course, you must complete and submit all major assignments, adhering to the assigned prompts. If you fail to submit a major assignment, you will fail this course. In addition, although you may complete and submit all work on time, you may still fail this course if your reading, writing, and language proficiency do not meet the minimum acceptable level needed for HUMA 1301. You are expected to have command of English essentials (proper use of grammar and mechanics) and use standard, academic, American English in all writings including emails. If you need help with grammar, there are tutors available as well as a wide range of resources available on the Web.

NOTE: Work that is off-topic or fails to follow instructions will not be accepted. All students must demonstrate competence in their in-class writing assignments to potentially pass Humanities 1301.

In addition, the following grades with zero grade points may also be recorded: "I" (Incomplete), "W" (Withdrawal), and "FX" (Failure due to poor class attendance).

Incomplete Policy:

In order to be considered for a grade of Incomplete ("I"), a student must have completed at least 75% of the coursework. It is the responsibility of the student to make arrangements with the instructor or to submit requisite work to complete the course and be assigned a grade. Student and instructor should execute a statement of work to be completed. A grade of incomplete which has not been made up after six months from the end of the term in which the "I" was assigned will be converted to an "F." In all cases, the instructor reserves the right to decline a student's request to receive a grade of Incomplete.

Withdrawal Policy:

Students may withdraw themselves on or before the withdrawal date. It is the student's responsibility to withdraw from a course. If students stop attending the class and don't withdraw by this date, they are subject to the FX grading policy. Instructors cannot withdraw students after the withdrawal date.

Final Grade of FX:

FX is assigned to students who stop attending class (participating in assignments, quizzes, discussions, etc.) and who do not withdraw themselves prior to the withdrawal deadline; either they may be dropped by their HCC faculty for non - attendance or be assigned the final grade of "FX" at the end of the semester. Students who stop attending classes will receive a grade of "FX," compared to an earned grade of "F" which is due to poor performance. It may also apply to students who disappear after the withdrawal deadline or fail to take the final exam in a course where one is administered. A grade of "FX" is treated exactly the same as a grade of "F" in terms of GPA, probation, suspension, and satisfactory academic progress. However, students who receive financial aid and receive an "FX" will be reported to the Department of Education and may have to pay back their financial aid and international students may be reported as not maintaining F-1 immigration status.

Syllabus Modifications

The instructor reserves the right to modify the syllabus at any time during the semester and will promptly notify students in writing, typically by e-mail, of any such changes.

Instructor's Practices and Procedures

Missed Assignments

It is critical that you keep up with the class. In other words, do not wait until the last minute to submit your work as this will adversely affect your grade. Absences, technical difficulties, job challenges, and other responsibilities may be reasons for not completing major assignments on time, but they are not excuses.

No makeups on daily assignments except for religious holiday observance. According to HCC policy, "if you observe a religious holiday and miss class, you must notify your instructor in writing two weeks in advance to arrange to take a test or make up an assignment." Note: make-up assignments are allowed only for missed assignments not to replace assignments. Late assignments will be docked a full letter grade per day up to three days; no late assignments will be accepted after three (3) days.

Academic Integrity

A student who is academically dishonest is, by definition, not showing that the coursework has been learned, and that student is claiming an advantage not available to other students. The instructor is responsible for measuring each student's individual achievements and also for ensuring that all students compete on a level playing field. Thus, in our system, the instructor has teaching, grading, and enforcing roles. You are expected to be familiar with HCC's policy on Academic Honesty. What that means is that if you are charged with an offense, pleading ignorance of the rules will not help you. To be clear, plagiarism (using another's ideas or words without giving credit), collusion (unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing written work offered for credit), and other forms of cheating will not be tolerated.

Students guilty of academic dishonesty can be given a grade of "F" or "0" for the particular test or assignment involved, assigned a failing grade in the course, and/or referred to the Dean of Student Services for further disciplinary action. In extreme cases or for repeated violations, guilty students are recommended for probation or dismissal from the College. Attendance Procedures

HCC Policy is that you can miss up to but not exceed 12.5% of class hours, which is equivalent to 6 hours in this course. If you have not attended class before the official date of record, you will be automatically withdrawn from the course by the registrar. Students who are withdrawn for nonattendance will not be reinstated. Although it is your responsibility to withdraw from a course, the instructor has the authority to withdraw you for excessive absences. You may be withdrawn from a course after accumulating absences in excess of 12.5 percent of the total hours of instruction (6 hours for this course).

Online Anytime Courses - Failure to actively participate (including failure to submit assignments) is equivalent to being absent.

Online on a Schedule Courses – Failure to log in during your scheduled class time and/or failure to actively participate (including failure to submit assignments) is equivalent to being absent.

Flex Courses – Failure to attend class in person or virtually during your scheduled class time and/or failure to actively participate (including failure to submit assignments) is equivalent to being absent. In order to maintain social distancing, you will be assigned specific days to attend class in person. When attending class in person, only attend on the days you have been assigned, else you will not be permitted to enter the classroom. When attending class virtually, you are expected to turn your cameras on during class.

Student Conduct

Your course grade is based on the degree to which you model professional behavior in my course. What does that mean? The following factors affect your grade:

- Class discussion: participating with relevant contributions in all or most online classroom discussions helps your professionalism grade. Your participations should be on topic and show your familiarity with the readings/lecture material, and your responses to other students should show that you paid close attention to what they wrote.
- Respect for others: respect for people of all identities and all reasonable viewpoints will help your professionalism grade. Specifically, please be sure to use respectful language that is not perceived as racist, sexist, ableist, homophobic, transphobic, or disparaging toward the appearance, bodies, body size/shape, gender, gender identity/presentation, or sexual orientation of any person, whether or not they are in the online classroom.
- Use constructive criticism: We will examine assignments from people in this class, from time-to-time; please speak about others' work as you would hope others would speak about your own work.
- Humanities 1301 is a gateway course in an institution of higher learning. Among us will
 be the fact of difference, of geographical region, socioeconomic status, sexual
 orientation, physical ability, age, ethnicity and gender, among other forms. Given
 these conditions, I ask you not only to tolerate difference but also to seek out
 opportunities to understand members of our class who identify in diverse ways.
- Avoiding disruptions: making sure that you respect the online learning environment
 will help your professionalism grade, as will avoiding personal arguments with me or
 other classmates in online discussions and any other facet of the class. Remember to
 keep interactions respectful to everyone, and to focus on course materials. Private
 concerns about personality conflicts with others should be addressed away from official
 class discussions so they do not disrupt everyone's learning.
- Respectfulness beyond the online classroom: Please remember your professionalism is still being assessed in email and in office hours. If we are engaged in class-related communications, the expectations for professional behavior and language apply.

Students are expected to show proper etiquette, respect the ideas of others, and ask for clarification if necessary. You are free to disagree with any ideas that are presented by others in class; this is part of the learning process, but you must be willing to support your own perspective, maintain a civil tone, and accept (not necessarily agree with) differences of opinion. At all times students are expected to maintain a professional presence. Abusive and hate language are considered disruptive behavior and will not be tolerated; a first offense will result in dismissal from the class session and a Maxient report. A second offense will result in dismissal from course and a second Maxient report.

- 1) Grades will not be discussed in class.
- 2) Before you and I discuss any questions or comments you have regarding a grade on an assignment, you must read all of the comments and then schedule an appointment.
- 3) I look primarily at content, organization, and development. Style, grammar, and mechanics are secondary. However, if style and grammar are such that the point is unintelligible, your grade will be affected.
- 4) Do not ask me at the end of the semester what your grade is. Wait for grade posting at semester's end.

Devices
