### **Course Description**

This course is a theoretically diverse introduction to the study of ideas, including arguments and investigations about abstract and real phenomena, particularly in the areas of knowledge, ethics, and religion. This course satisfies the Language, Philosophy and Culture or Component Area Option of the HCC core.

Written Assignment	20%	Critical Paper & Writing Workshop	There will be one paper assigned in this class, namely, a <b>Critical Paper</b> due in Week 13. This 3-4 page paper will require you to accurately explain a philosophical argument, and then to suggest an objection toor critique of that argument, all in a concise amount of space. You will also participate in a <b>Writing Workshop</b> that same week, whose points will contribute to your grade on the Critical Paper, that will include a draft or portion of your paper that you will share with me and/or your classmates to help you prepare to submit your polished paper.
Exams	60%	Exam 1, Exam 2, Exam 3	There will be <b>three Exams</b> (in Weeks 5, 11, and 16), each covering approximately one third of the course material. These exams will include primarily short essay questions as well as multiple-choice questions, all about the course readings and our discussions of them. Each exam is worth 20% of the final grade; collectively, they account for 60% of the final grade.

This course will assess participation, first of all, via your contributions to our weekly Discussion Boards on Canvas. These threads will begin with questions I pose to get you thinking about the readings for the week. You will then contribute your own thoughts, in response to my questions as well as to the contributions of your classmates. You should also participate during our class meetings and discussions, coming to my Virtual Office Hours, and emailing me questions or comments. Your participation takes place via yourengagement with the course; the above activities represent the sum total of that engagement.
