

Course Overview

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development, thought processes, and personality.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- *Critical Thinking*: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Quantitative and Empirical Literacy**: Students will demonstrate the ability to draw conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- Social Responsibility: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Written Assignment(s)

You may choose to watch a movie or read a book about a person with a psychological disorder. Write a 2- 3 page essay (15 points), beginning with the definition of the disorder from your textbook (15 points). Continue with a synopsis of the plot (25 points), and how the disorder is revealed in the main character (35 points). Include a title page with your name and due date (5 points). It must be typed, single-spaced with a 10-12 font (5 points).

Handwritten Papers will not be accepted! Late papers will lose 25 points for each day for two days only! This counts as 20% of your grade (200 points).

Exams

There will be 5 unit exams taken in class during the semester (the best 4 of 5) counting 400 points toward students' course grade. The lowest grade will be dropped. There are no make-up exams! Each exam will contain 50 multiple choice questions (2 points each) counting 100 points from the material covered in lectures and the textbook. You will have 75 minutes to complete the exam. Be on time to have the full 75 minutes! You will need to purchase Scantrons and #2 pencils for all exams. There will be 6 Quizzes which may be announced or unannounced (the best 4 of 6) consisting of Matching, Fill-in-the-Blank and/or True/False (10-20 questions each). You are allowed to use class notes, handwrittten or typed only. You will have 20-30 minutes to take the quiz. It may be given at anytime during the class. The quizzes count 200 points toward students' course grade. There are no make-ups. Exams and quizzes will be reviewed the following class period.

Practice Final Exam

You are required to take the Comprehensive Practice Final which will be given to help you prepare for the Final Exam. 100 Multiple choice questions will be worth 100 points (20% of the grade you earn with a maximum of 20 points) will be counted with all grades. You will have 2 hours to complete the exam.

Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam

All students will be required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple- choice questions. All the information students need to prepare for the exam is in the https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources. The exam will be administered in class on the date shown in the Course Calendar. Students must provide their own Scantron forms (FORM NUMBER 882-E-LOVAS). The final exam may not be taken early under any circumstances. Insert the point value or weight of the final exam.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Students who are absent from the final exam must discuss their absence with the instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward. There are no make-ups for the Departmental Final except on a case by case basis.

This system is based on 1000 points plus Extra Credit for the Practice Final (required) and voluntary participation in the Evaluation Survey of the Professor and/or campus presentations pertaining to Psychology (5 points each) with a maximum of 20 points.
