SPAN 2311, The consolidation of skills acquired at the introductory level. Further development of proficiency in listening, speaking, reading and writing. Emphasis on comprehension, appreciation, and interpretation of the cultures of the Spanish-speaking world.

- **Critical Thinking**: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing an essay assignment on a topic introduced in the course readings.
- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective expression of ideas through completion of two oral presentations and class discussion on cultural topics.

6.Describe cultural practices and products of the Spanish-speaking world drawing on authentic materials including literature and the visual arts.

Student Success

Expect to spend at least twice as many hours per week outside of class as you do in class studying the course content. If you are taking this class online, you will need to spend at

least 9 hours per week, working on your assignments. Additional time will be required for written assignments so be sure to pay attention to the due dates of the assignments to allow yourself enough time to complete them. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of the following:

- Logging into the Supersite and Canvas several times per week;
- Reading the textbook;
- Completing assignments on time;
- Participating in assigned activities.

There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading), writing, and studying the material using the course objectives as a guide.

Spanish is the only language you will write and speak for a grade

Every Portales lesson begins by showing new Spanish words in audio and/or written form. Practice this Spanish vocabulary over and over until you automatically recognize and respond to those words in Spanish. After learning all the new Spanish words and phrases, you will watch videos in Spanish so you can hear how those Spanish words are used in a communicative context by Spanish speakers. After that, you should begin your assignments. **All Online Assignments, Online Chapter Tests and the Proctored Final Exam must be done in Spanish.** Any assignment with English or any other language besides Spanish will be given a 0 (zero). Using the Spanish words and phrases given to you in Portales is the key to success in this course.

Online Assignments, Online Chapter Tests and the Final Exam

Online Assignments 40%

The Portales VHL Central Supersite linked to Canvas that accompanies your textbook has online activities for listening, grammar, reading, writing, vocabulary, and culture. These will be done either in a computer lab on campus or at home. This will be done through the Portales VHL Central Supersite linked to Canvas. These activities will be graded and count for 30% of your grade.

Online Chapter Tests 30%

You will take a test at the conclusion of each chapter. The tests will include the following sections: listening, grammar, reading, writing and speaking. Tests will count for 40% of your grade.

Online Final Exam 30%

Students will be required to take an online comprehensive final exam. The exam will be very similar in format to the chapter tests you have taken at the end of each chapter. The difference is that it will cover all six chapters. **The comprehensive final exam will be given the last week of the semester and it will count 30% of your final grade.** If you have completed every assignment and taken every lesson test, you will be fully prepared for the final exam. The final will be mostly writing short answers, sentences and paragraphs. If you have completed all the assignments and lesson tests, you will be prepared. **If you have not completed all the work, you will find the final exam extremely challenging.**
