






### **Course Overview for ENGL 1301**

ENGL 1301 is an intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis. Core curriculum course.

# **Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs) for all ENGL Core Courses**

ENGL 1301 satisfies three (3) hours of the communication requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS English Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- *Critical Thinking*: Students will demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- **Communication**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Personal Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.
- **Teamwork**: Students will demonstrate the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.

#### **Student Success in ENGL**

As with any three-hour course, expect to spend **at least six hours per week** outside of class reading and studying the material. I will provide assignments to help you use those six hours per week wisely. Additional time will be required for written assignments. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of reading the textbook, attending class, completing assignments in Eagle Online, and participating in class discussions. There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as your guide.

### **Instructor and Student Responsibilities**

#### As your Instructor, it is my responsibility to:

- Facilitate an effective learning environment through class activities, discussions, and lectures

# **Assignments**

## **Written Assignments and Essays**

Students will write a minimum of 5,000 words over the course of the semester, including:

#### • THREE MAJOR ESSAYS

 These essays will account for the majority of your grade in the class, and will largely be written outside of class, with small planning assignments & peer review sessions leading up to the submission of the final draft. You must turn your essays in on time on the day that they're due; I do not accept late papers.

### TWO IN-CLASS ESSAYS (Midterm & Final)

 These two essays will both be handwritten during class time, and will be based on a selection of readings from our textbook. The purpose of these is to measure your critical thinking skills and your ability to organize your thoughts in a coherent way within a limited amount of time.

#### ONLINE WRITING ASSIGNMENTS

 Occasionally you will be required to complete various small writing assignments to supplement whatever we have been doing in class. These will mostly be done over the weekends and must all be submitted on Canvas.

#### JOURNALS

Frequently in class you will be asked to complete certain handwritten assignments in your journal. Some of these assignments will involve working with a group, while some will be done individually. I will be checking the journals occasionally throughout the semester. Most (not necessarily all) journal assignments will be completion grades, with "completion" here meaning "you made a genuine effort and did what was asked of you."

### **Grammar Quizzes**

Throughout the semester you will be required to complete four online grammar quizzes. We will not have much time in class to go over grammar, so the information you need to complete these quizzes will be provided to you through online slideshows, which can be found on Canvas. Each quiz will be 20-25 questions (4-5 pts. each), and will be untimed; you are welcome to consult your notes, the slideshows, or external grammar sources while you take them. You have the opportunity to take each quiz up to five times, with the highest score being kept at the end. These quizzes will be completed at your own pace throughout the semester, though I will give specific dates for when I want you to have made a first attempt.

#### **In-Class Activities**

Most of our in-class activities will be either group or individual writing prompts, which will be completed in your journals. I also expect everyone to participate in class discussions.

# **Academic Integrity**

Plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated. Partial plagiarism (between 20-40%) on one of the major papers will earn you a failing grade automatically; if more than 40% of your paper is plagiarized, you will receive an automatic zero – no exceptions, no excuses. If you procrastinate and find you cannot get an assignment done, or if you feel your writing is not up to the quality you'd like it to be, then you must turn in your own original work anyway. An incomplete or poorly written assignment is better than a plagiarized one.

To be clear, plagiarism is more than simply copying someone else's exact words without giving them credit. It also includes copying someone else's work and switching out a few words with synonyms, or rephrasing their sentences on only the barest surface level. In either case, you are still stealing work from someone else and demonstrating that you have not understood or thought critically about what you are reading/writing, which defeats the whole purpose of the assignment.

Regular attendance is extremely important in this class. HCC attendance policy states that a student may miss up to but no more than 12.5% of total class time, which is equivalent to six hours (not six classes, six *hours*). I make no differentiation between excused or unexcused absences. If you miss class, you are responsible for the work and notes you may have missed; some assignments can be made up, but others cannot, so you must ask me if you wish to make up missing work. If you know ahead of time that you will be absent or late to class, please let me know through email or the Canvas inbox.

Any work that is due on the day you were absent is still due that day, especially the three major essays. It is up to you to see that I receive your work, either through Canvas, email, or having another student deliver it for you. Likewise, any announcements, changes to the syllabus, or changes to the calendar, are still applicable to you even if you are not present. Make sure you check Canvas & your HCC email regularly to stay informed; you may sign up for mobile updates through Canvas to receive notifications of changes directly to your phone.

Attendance is absolutely required on the day of the Midterm and Final. If you cannot be in class that day for whatever reason, it's your responsibility to let me know ahead of time, and we will arrange a time for you to make it up. Failure to complete the Midterm or Final will result in an automatic "F" for the entire semester.

If you have more than four absences before the official day of record (Monday 9/9) you may be automatically withdrawn from the class. In all other cases, I will not automatically drop you from the class, even if you stop attending completely. It is up to you to drop the class if you wish to avoid an "F" on your transcript. **The last day to withdraw is Friday 11/1.**

#### **Electronic Devices in the Classroom**

We will use laptops, tablets and/or smartphones from time to time in class, but all electronic devices should be put away during class unless otherwise instructed. If you disrupt class, I reserve the right to confiscate your electronic devices for the duration of class, to be given back at the end of the period, or to ask you to leave class if you refuse to comply.

#### **Participation & Respect**

In general, I expect everyone to treat both me and your fellow students with the same level of respect and courtesy that you would like for yourself, and to do your best to be a thoughtful participant in all class discussions and activities. Disruptive or disrespectful behavior may result in you being dismissed from the class.

#### **Late Work**

While I do accept late work on some assignments, I do <u>not</u> accept late work for the 3 major papers. You must make sure that I receive your essays on the day they are due, even if you are absent. If you submit your essay to me on the day it's due, but several hours late, then I will still accept it, but you will get late points deducted depending on how late it is. Once the day is over, I will no longer accept any papers at all. There will be no exceptions to this rule, period.
