Citing Information Sources: MLA Style Quick Guide (MLA Handbook 8th Edition)

The examples included below illustrate the appropriate formats for citing some online and print sources in a "Bibliography" or "References" page. The sources that are not illustrated below, ask your professor or a librarian, or consult the *Modern Language Association of America* (8th ed.).

Work Cited Page: Your citations must be double-spaced. Use hanging indentation and alphabetize all entries by author. Italicize titles of databases and independent works such as plays, books, periodicals, and websites. Place quotations on titles of articles, chapters, essays, poems, & short stories. Abbreviate the publisher's name. Abbreviate all months except May, June, and July on the Work Cited page.
