Course Description

This course will build on previously acquired skills of black and white film exposure, processing and printing and guide students in developing personal outlooks toward specific applications of the photographic process. This course satisfies the fine arts component of the HCCS core

This class requires extra time outside of class, usually about 5 – 10 hours per week. I realize that this is a significant time commitment. If you feel like you will be unable to fulfill this you may want to reconsider this class.

Course Goals

- 1. Understand and apply further design principles in photography.
- 2. Further develop standards of quality in photography.
- 3. Further develop technical knowledge and skills
- 4. Increase your understanding and knowledge of the history of photography and contemporary photographer.
- 5. Improve and develop writing about photography.
- 6. This course meets the basic intellectual competencies for core courses including reading, writing, speaking, listening, critical thinking and computer literacy.

Course Structure

The course is composed of 7 major components

- 1. Lectures and demonstrations (some may be outside regular class time)
- 2. Lab work most of your lab work should be done outside of class
- 3. Field Trips.
- 4. Critiques there will be 5 critiques during the semester
- 5. Shooting film (most of this will be done on your own time)
- 6. Readings and research
- 7. Journal

Attendance

Attendance of lectures, field trips and critiques are essential to your success in this class and to the quality of class discussions. If a student misses two critiques or has more than 3 unexcused absences, the instructor has the right to withdraw the student from the class and issue a 'W'. This may affect financial aid and/or student visa status. If you know that you are going to be late or absent, let me know so that I can be prepared. Class starts at 6 pm sharp, I make an effort to be here on time, you should too. Three tardies = one absence.

Grading

Final grades will be determined as follows:

Journal 20%
Participation 20%
Other Critiques 10%

A late assignment receives an automatic one-letter grade deduction no matter how late it is. An unexcused absence from a critique results in a two-letter grade deduction on that assignment.

Other Rules and Information

Friends are not allowed in the lab areas. No pets in the lab. No smoking in the lab. No food or drinks are allowed. No open-toed shoes are allowed in the darkroom. I suggest sneakers, the darkroom floor can easily become slick, and you need all the cushion you can get for standing for long periods on a concrete floor. Pick up any trash you generate in the lab or classroom. Leave everything straight and clean. This is your lab while you are using it. There is no one to clean up after you except other students. Please take this responsibility seriously. If you don't, you will not be allowed to use the lab.

In general, photographic and lab equipment is precision, fragile equipment. **Never** use force with cameras, enlargers, etc. Everything should work smoothly and easily. If not, ask for help. If anything is broken or needs attention, I and/or the TA need to know about it as soon as possible. Be patient, and do your best with what we have.
