What's Exciting About This Course

MUSI 1306 is a foundation course in understanding and enjoyment of music through the use of recorded music and song literature. Elements of music and analysis of music form and how they relate to compositional technique are explored. This survey course will develop a learning perception through a survey of western European music and artistic media. This course will develop one's listening perception through lectures, recordings, videos, and concerts. The course will also include a discussion of the basic music elements, such as melody, rhythm, harmony, timbre, texture, form and acoustics. A historical perspective and overview of all musical periods of Western Civilization Art Music will also be studied.



Course Overview

Understanding music through the study of cultural periods, major composers, and musical elements, illustrated with audio recordings and live performances. Course does not apply to a music major degree.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

MUSI 1306 satisfies the fine arts requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Core Curriculum Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- Critical Thinking: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- Communication Skills: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Teamwork**: Ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.
- Social Responsibility: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Program Student Learning Outcomes (PSLOs)

These Program Student Learning Outcomes refer to students who are majoring in Music. They are listed on every music course syllabus.

- 1. Keyboard Skills: The student will demonstrate mastery of scales, chords, & harmonization of melodies using varied accompaniment techniques. Students will perform selected compositions and demonstrate competence in various transpositions.
- 2. Music Theory Skills: The student will analyze and compose advanced 4 measure segments which include; harmony, melody, rhythm, and cadences.
- 3. Ear Training Skills: The student will sing and notate diatonic and chromatic intervals, chords, rhythms, and harmonic chord progressions.
- 4. Music Literature Skills: The student will be able to identify and describe the periods of music history including general style characteristics, major composers of each period, and representative works. Students will be able to critically evaluate musical works and articulate the relationship between historical events and musical styles/aesthetics.
- 5. Ensemble Performance Skills: The student will apply learned vocal/instrumental skills and techniques in an ensemble performance.

6. Solo Performance Skills: The student will demonstrate learned vocal/ instrumental skills and techniques in a jury of 5-10 minutes of music appropriate to MUAP Semester 4 SLO's in a solo performance.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs)

Upon completion of MUSI 1306, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify musical works and elements in a variety of styles.
- 2. Analyze the elements and structures of music using appropriate terminology.
- 3. Critically evaluate the influence of social, political, technological, and/or cultural ideas on music.
- 4. Articulate the significance of music as an art form within historical, cultural and social contexts.

Learning Objectives

Student will use the Student Learning Outcome skills to successfully move into college level Music History. SCANS or Core Curriculum Statement and Other Standards: Credit: 3 (3 lecture) This course is designed to prepare students for college level Theory and aural skills. This class serves as a fine arts elective and also fulfills a core curriculum requirement.

Student Success

Expect to spend at least twice as many hours per week outside of class as you do in class studying the course content. Additional time will be required for written assignments. In-person sections of MUSI 1306 meet for 3 hours a week. The assignments provided will help you use your study hours wisely. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of the following:

- Reading the textbook
- Attending class in person and/or online
- Completing assignments
- Participating in class activities

There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as a guide.

Missed Assignments

PLAGIARISM is copying another student's work, or an already published work. It is also misquoting or not properly citing a source, and claiming it as your own, whether intentional or not.

Students plagiarizing the first time may be given one warning and an automatic "0" but will be given the opportunity to redo the assignment within the assignment time limits.

Students who plagiarize a second time WILL FAIL THE COURSE AND/OR MAY BE SUSPENDED OR EXPELLED FROM HCC.

Turnitin is a service through Canvas/Eagle Online where students submit their work and it is checked for plagiarism. If more than 15% of the work is plagiarized, students may be asked to edit the work or take a 50% or 0% the first time.

Maxient is an online service where HCC professors can report plagiarism and cheating, and it will be linked to the students' permanent education record through

the Dean of Students. If someone is caught cheating or plagiarizing, it will now be reported through Maxient.

Attendance Procedures

Attendance in the class is monitored electronically. If you do not do the assignments for a time equally 12-1/2 % of the class, you risk losing the class. I cannot extend deadlines except under extreme circumstances, such as a provable medical emergency.

Student Assignments

Graded Assignments:

Graded assignments include weekly reading assignments, quizzes, listening assignments and a discussion activity. Scores for quizzes, reading and listening assignments will be available immediately.

All graded assignments are due on Sunday at midnight, **not including** the Final Weeks' Assignments and the Final Presentation.

Reading Assignments: The reading assignments will be done by the Connect LearnSmart program. Please read and take the practice quizzes. You must take the practice quizzes in order to receive full credit for the weekly readings.

Quizzes and listening assignments:

All quizzes are timed and may be taken only once. Quizzes and listening assignments will automatically close at the time they are due and will not reopen. The listening assignments will be given credit only if you listen to the entire song and submit the correct answer. (two attempts)

Please be sure to have completed all quizzes and assignments within the timeframe they are assigned. (All assignments with the exception of the Final Weeks' Assignments and Presentation close on Sunday at midnight).

Discussion Forum Requirements:

Two discussion topics will be given each week. You must write about each discussion and post a minimum of **100 words** (your own plus a quotation, if desired) for each topic. If you choose to use a direct quotation, it must be indicated by quotation marks and by citing the source. Quotations cannot be longer than 50 words.

You must then follow up with a minimum of **three substantive responses** per topic to the posts of your classmates.

Before midnight (Central Time) every Sunday you should have posted at least 3 replies to your classmates. If you do not make an initial substantive post to each topic 8 points may be deducted from your score. Seven points may also be deducted from your score for failing to post substantively on the second topic.

Posts that do not meet the criteria for being substantive will not earn any points. For comments/posts to be considered substantive, each one must meet the following criteria:

- 1.a) contain a minimum of 100 words written by the student in paragraph format
- 2. b) create a clear connection to the topic and/or the post of another student which relates to the topic and/or
- 3.c) extend the meaning of the initial post by offering related yet new information or
- 4.d) relate a personal experience to support the discussion topic or
- 5.e) reference information from the course text to support the discussion or
- 6.f) demonstrate correct grammar and usage (sentence structure, punctuation, spelling), and
- 7.g) overall--include content with a high degree of readability.

Summary of Discussion Forum Priorities:

•Substantive response to topics: 100 words minimum

- •All posts must be substantive (see definition above) in order to earn points.
- •You must reply to 3 classmate's discussions per topic each week (6 in total). (A minimum of 1 point will be deducted for each missed reply)
- •The same response to more than one student will not be credited.

Concert Reports:

Students must attend or view two **classical** concerts during the semester, and write two concert reports describing the concert event. The Concert Reports are due on December 8, 2020 before 5 pm. If you have completed them beforehand, you may turn them into the appropriate module at any time since the Concert Reports are open from the first day of class.

The concerts attended or viewed must be related to the course material, such as a symphony, opera, ballet, choir, jazz, musical theater, non-Western music, or a recital. Concerts in which you participate or participated are not acceptable.

The two reports will count as 10% of the final grade. The concert reports must be turned in on or before the due date. The concert report form can be found in the learning web or on the canvas website. Please download the form and fill out the report.

The Concert Report Form which you will use is found in the Concert Report Module.

Final Presentation

Final presentation is like a paper. You will write 800 words of one of the composers we have studied in this class. You need to include a citation (quotation) of not more than 50 words from an outside source and cite the source.

You must also provide a YouTube link to a performance of a work by that composer so that your classmates can watch and listen to the performance. It doesn't matter

how many sources you consult, however, please cite the material correctly. The format of the final presentation will be like the discussion forums.

You will turn in your original presentation by December 6 and reply to 5 classmates by December 8 at 5 p.m.

Student Conduct

Students are expected to be courteous to their online classmates and to the instructor. Please use classmates' names in your responses.
