









COURSE DESCRIPTION: Government 2306 is one of two courses designed to introduce students to the politics of government at the national, state and local levels. This course is fully transferable to other colleges and universities. The course curriculum will include the following areas: Origin and development of the Texas Constitution, the structure and powers of state and local government, intergovernmental relations, political participation, the campaign/election process, public policy and the political culture of Texas. The course will basically be divided into three modules each resulting in an assessment to evaluate learning outcomes. We will certainly address high profile current events, particularly the impact of COVID 19 on the political and policy-making process, as well on the economy. Current events should demonstrate the importance of the states, particularly Texas. This is a self-paced on-line course, but I encourage each of you to log in every day just to stay informed and up to date.

The Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) mandates that the core curriculum must ensure that students will develop the essential knowledge and skills they need to be successful in college, in a career, in their communities, and in life. Through the Texas Core Curriculum, students will gain a foundation of knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world, develop principles of personal and social responsibility for living in a diverse world, and advance intellectual and practical skills that are essential for all learning. Students enrolled in GOVT 2305/2306 core curriculum courses will complete assessments designed to measure the following core objectives:

- **Critical Thinking Skills**—to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information
- **Communication Skills**—to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication
- **Personal Responsibility**—to include the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making
- Social Responsibility—to include the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making

Student assessment of proficiencies mandated by THECB may include testing, projects, or assignments.

Program Student Learning Outcomes (PSLOs)

- 1. Identify and describe the institutions of the State of Texas government
- 2. Identify and evaluate information sources for political news, data, and opinion.
- **3.** Analyze the effects of the historical, social, political, economic, and cultural forces on politics and government.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
- 2. Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
- 3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas government.
- 5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
- 6. Analyze the state and local election process.
- 7. Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
- 8. Analyze issues, policies and political culture of Texas.

Student Success

Expect to spend at least twice as many hours per week on your own in addition to the time you would normally spend during instruction. Additional time will be required for written assignments. The assignments provided will help you use your study hours wisely. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of thefollowing:

- Reading the textbook
- Attending class in person and/or online
- Completing assignments
- Participating in class activities

There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as yourguide.

Instructor and Student Responsibilities

As your Instructor, it is my responsibility to:

- Provide the grading scale and detailed grading formula explaining how student grades are to be derived
- Facilitate an effective learning environment through learner-centered instructional techniques
- Provide a description of any special projects or assignments
- Inform students of policies such as attendance, withdrawal, tardiness, and makeup
- Provide the course outline and class calendar which will include a description of any special projects or assignments
- Arrange to meet with individual students before and after class as required

- Read and comprehend the textbook
- Complete the required assignments and exams
- Ask for help when there is a question or problem

- Be aware of and comply with academic honesty policies in the <u>>>></u>

EXAMS: The three major exams will comprise **53%** percent of your final grade. Each test will consist of narrative essay/short answer questions or some version of an in-class exercise or simulation. They will **not** be traditional exams. There will be no objective - multiple choice or True/False questions. This method is more conducive to this on-line method of delivery that does not include a lecture component. Some effort will be devoted to review test expectations before the first exam. This method also proved to be very effective during the previous semester. The applicable questions will come from posted PowerPoint slides, independent reading assignments, discussions, simulations and other activities. This means that you will have to take individual responsibility for preparation of some portion of the test materials. I would suggest that you maintain your class preparation activities on a systematic and consistent basis in order to be more successful on the test. Most evidence indicates that "cramming" usually does **not** result in a successful grade or the retention of relevant information. I will **not** drop the lowest test scores and will work with each student to address make-up exams.

ASSIGNMENTS: You will be given an assignment related to each exam that will count **30-35 points** each. These will self- paced assignments and you will have more than ample time to complete them. They will be given to you at the beginning of each section of test materials and you will turn them in on the applicable date posted on the Syllabus. They will be based on activities identified above. **Fifteen points** will be deducted for each class session the assignments are turned in late. I will **not** accept assignments after each exam since they are specifically designed for test preparation.

DISCUSSIONS: There will be a series of grades discussions based on a variety of high-profile topics, You tube clips, and a number of current events. They will be posted on your Canvas Modules.

PROJECT: You will have three options for your class project. See Attachment #1-3 for additional details.



There will also be 10 point "*scavenger hunt*" Syllabus quiz to document your understanding of the policies and procedures of HCCS, as well as those that are specific to this class.

GRADING: You will have the opportunity to earn a maximum of **570** points. Grades will be determined by the percentage of total points you earn based on the scale of 90- 100%-A, 80-89%-B, 70-79%-C, 60-69%-D and 59% and below an F. The minimum number of points for each letter grade is asfollows:

Government 2306- CLASS PROJECT 100 POINTS Attachment #1

This written project involves an analysis/evaluation of a number components included in the 2306 course curriculum. The project will allow you to create a hypothetical political campaign providing you an opportunity to facilitate a context for an analysis, gathering evidence to justify your position, as well as coming to your conclusions.

In this scenario, you will act as a recent graduate and successful entrepreneur has decided to run for a seat in the Texas Legislature. This project is designed to create a structure for your campaign consisting of a five to six page double- spaced typed paper addressing the following components A-D. Select an additional component from options E-G :

A. Select an **existing member** of the Texas House or Texas Senate as your opponent. You can assume that are or the chosen nominee who won your open primary facing the opponent of the opposition party **or** you can assume that you or going to challenge an incumbent member in his/her open primary. Write a profile of your opponent.

B. Select a *Special Interest Group* that you would solicit support from and identify/describe how would use their support.



C. Select and describe a minimum of one structural changes you would fight for in the legislative, executive and judicial branches of government and explain why they are necessary. Describe how you would seek to accomplish this by law or by constitutional remedies. You may propose new strategies addressing previous failed attempts at changing/amending the 1876 Constitution. If you believe the current constitutional system works, explain why and what



you would do to maintain this system as it currently exist.

Essentially, you can argue it has and continues to work!

D. Select a specific social **or** economic issue /law that you will target **issue** and fight for once elected. Explain your position, as well as your rationale for your chosen position.



E. Identify a state agency you will identify for additional legislative oversight justifying why more



scrutiny is warranted.

F. Since you built a successful academic and business career entrepreneur in Houston, describe one change would you propose to influence or impact the current city charter to address your

concerns about the political system in *Houston*.



G. Select and describe a campaign slogan and campaign song and explain how/why they are significant to your political success. Address the use of social media and how will be used in your campaign.



The assignment will include the following *four value components:*

*Evidence *Context *Student's Position * Conclusions and Outcomes

The written component should have a minimum of three sources using the MLA or APA format in documenting citations.. I will also include a rubric as a guide to this written assignment.

All three options will lose 30 points if the project is submitted late and will not be accepted more than one day after the original due date.

This option is to become a noted Statentologist...

STATENTOLOGY the new science of evaluating state governments and their corresponding public policies. Involves the act of grading or assessing.

Create an evaluation (Report Card) for Texas. Create an evaluation of the political or policy- making process in Texas. You may choose to assign **Texas** a Grade or implement an alternative assessment system. This will be dependent on the grading system/criterion you have created. Your report cards should justify and document your assessment. Be willing to offer praise, as well as criticism....

There should be a 2-3 page supplement explaining your assessment. How and why did Texas receive their score?

Create your own interest group Brochure. Create a name, logo purpose, strategy that your group to influence the electoral or policy-making system **in Texas**. For this option, you will need to supplement the brochure with a justifying the 'NEED" for the creation of your group. You should include written supplement that justifies the need for this hypothetical group. **This supplement should include a 2-3 page analysis**. This analysis should provide the appropriate data/ statistics etc...to justify the need for your group as part of your project. Remember-you will need money, members and credibility.
