MUAP 1115 is an introductory course in learning about and playing the bass. We will explore bass and string technique for the left hand and right hand, posture, appropriate repertoire, reading, and prominent bass/string composers and performers.

Prerequisites and/or Co-Requisites

MUAP 1115 requires college-level reading and writing skills. Research indicates that you are most likely to succeed if you have already taken and passed ENGL 1301. If you have enrolled in this course having satisfied these prerequisites, you have a higher chance of success than students who have not done so. Please carefully read and consider the repeater policy in the <u>HCCS Student Handbook</u>. It is STRONGLY recommended you either have taken or be currently enrolled in MUSI 1303 Fundamentals of Music, or in MUSI 1311 Music Theory I. The co-requisite for this course is MUAP 1113, Bass I.

If you are a music major pursuing an AA in Music, you should also be enrolled in a Music Theory course, Sight Singing & Ear Training course, Piano Class course, an ensemble, and MUAP Private lessons and studio in the instrument in which you specialize. Please see a fulltime music instructor or your MUAP instructor for academic advising and to learn how you can finish a music degree in 2-3 years with proper guidance.

Course Overview

Studio performance and instruction in bass. Course may apply to a music degree.

Program Student Learning Outcomes (PSLOs)

- 1. Keyboard Skills: The student will demonstrate mastery of scales, chords, & harmonization of melodies using varied accompaniment techniques. Students will perform selected compositions and demonstrate competence in various transpositions.
- 2. Music Theory Skills: The student will analyze and compose advanced 4 measure segments which include; harmony, melody, rhythm, and cadences.
- 3. Ear Training Skills: The student will sing and notate diatonic and chromatic intervals, chords, rhythms, and harmonic chord progressions.
- 4. Music Literature Skills: The student will be able to identify and describe the periods of music history including general style characteristics, major composers of each period, and representative works. Students will be able to critically evaluate musical works and articulate the relationship between historical events and musical styles/aesthetics.
- 5. Ensemble Performance Skills: The student will apply learned vocal/instrumental skills and techniques in an ensemble performance.
- 6. Solo Performance Skills: The student will demonstrate learned vocal/instrumental skills and techniques in a jury of 5-10 minutes of music appropriate to MUAP Semester 4 SLO's in a solo performance.

Course Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs)

Upon completion of MUAP 1115, the student will have/be able to:

1. Perform using correct alignment of the instrument, correct position of left hand, and proper bow control and breathing 70% of the time.

- 2. Perform with good tone quality 70% of the time.
- 3. Perform using proper bow articulation 70% of the time.
- 4. Perform with good intonation and rhythm 70% of the time.
- 5. Demonstrate scales, arpeggios, and etudes studied during the semester with 70% accuracy.
- 6. Perform with pleasing, consistent vibrato 70% of the time.
- 7. Demonstrate understanding of appropriate musical styles, phrasing and expression through repertoire prepared for jury at 70% accuracy.

*These SLOs align directly with the corresponding lesson, MUAP 1113.

Learning Objectives

Student will use the Student Learning Outcome skills to successfully learn and play bass in a variety of styles and environments. Additionally the student will demonstrate appropriate technique and general knowledge of the instrument.

Student Success

Expect to spend at least twice as many hours per week outside of class as you do in class studying the course content. Additional time will be required for written assignments. The assignments provided will help you use your study hours wisely. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of the following:

- Reading the textbook
- Attending class in person and/or online
- Completing assignments
- Participating in class activities

There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as a guide.

Instructor and Student Responsibilities

As your Instructor, it is my responsibility to:

- Provide the grading scale and detailed grading formula explaining how student grades are to be derived
- Facilitate an effective learning environment through learner-centered instructional techniques
- Provide a description of any special projects or assignments

Assignments, Exams, and Activities

Performances/Recordings

Students are required to either perform publicly or participate in a recording project this semester. In class we will discuss our options and plan accordingly.

In-Class Activities

Students should expect to play every lesson. Bringing your bass and materials as well as showing up to class prepared with the previous weeks assignments is crucial to passing this class

Jury/Recital

The final exam will take place either; in the form of a recital (adjudicated by other faculty) at the end of the semester, or a jury on December 7th at central campus.

Students who are absent from the jury/recital without discussing their absence with the instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward will receive an exam grade of "F". Students who cannot make the jury/recital due to health or emergency reasons will receive an "incomplete". This grade will stand until it is replaced the following semester, otherwise it will turn into an "F" the following semester.
