Course Overview

Course Description

Basic Spanish language skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a cultural framework. Students will acquire the vocabulary and grammatical structures necessary to communicate and comprehend at the beginner level. SPAN 1411 is part of the component area option of the core curriculum.

Transfers as a foreign language credit.

All grades will be posted on Canvas; all assignments will be posted on Canvas and Connect/McGraw-Hill, please keep a good record of your grades since it is your responsibility as a college student.

Assignments, Exams, and Activities

Exams

Students will take a test at the conclusion of each chapter. The tests will include the following sections: listening, grammar, reading, writing, and speaking. Tests will count 30% of your grade.

NOTE: the test is over the material covered in the chapter; hence, you **MUST** use the vocabulary and grammar presented in the chapter. If you use vocabulary and grammar that we have not covered; you will lose points or you can get a zero.

Class Participation

Students must participate in class each day. Participation includes:

- · Log in to the course daily to read any messages or announcements.
- Keep up with the Course Calendar and the due dates.
- Read the assigned materials (presentations, articles, websites, or chapters).
- Complete the assignments and discussions according to the instructions and submit them on time.
- Contact the professor if you have any questions or problems.

Class participation counts for 20% of your total course grade with the homework that is due in the classroom.

Class participation means being actively involved in assigned activities, such as online discussion forums, vocabulary practice and conversation practice on topics related to the assigned chapters in the textbook. This will require that you purchase a textbook by the first day of class. Attendance is factored into your participation and will be measured by the number of times each week that you log into Canvas and Connect. Class participation and attendance will count as 20% of your grade.

Homework/ONLINE ACTIVITIES

The Supersite that accompanies your textbook has online activities for listening, grammar, reading, writing, vocabulary, and culture. These can be done in a computer lab on campus or at home. In addition, you will submit a journal entry for each chapter you complete in the textbook. This will be done through the Supersite. These activities will be graded and count for 20% of your grade.

ALL the corresponding WORKBOOK pages must be completed before taking the exam for each chapter in a paper workbook. For this class; all workbook pages will be done online. These materials are due at the time that the chapter exam is taken. If the work is not completed, a grade of "0" will be given. At least 60% of the workbook must be completed in order to obtain any kind of credit. They will be graded and count for 20% of your final grade along with the class participation grade.

All assignments will be posted on Connect in/or Canvas.

Final Exam

All students will be required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam. The exam will be very similar in format to the chapter exams you have at the end of each chapter with a listening, grammar, reading, and writing section. The difference is that it will cover all six 6 chapters. The final exam will be given the last week of class and it will count 30% of your total grade. *Final*

NOTE: A STUDENT WHO HAS AN "A" AVERAGE IN EVERYTHING (exams, homework, class participation, and quizzes) CAN BE EXEMPT FROM TAKING THE FINAL EXAM. ONLY THOSE STUDENTS WHO ARE NOTIFIED BY THE PROFESSOR WILL BE EXEMPT, EVERYONE ELSE MUST TAKE THE FINAL EXAM, IF NOT, A GRADE OF "0" WILL BE GIVEN FOR THE FINAL EXAM AND IT WILL BE AVERAGED WITH THE REST OF THE GRADES.
