Course Overview

INRW 0300 is a corequisite course in support of ENGL 1301, which is an intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis. Core curriculum course.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

INRW 0300 is a support course paired with ENGL 1301, which satisfies three (3) hours of the communication requirement in the HCC core curriculum. The HCCS English Discipline Committee and the INRW Discipline Committee have specified that ENGL 1301 and INRW 0300 address the following objectives:

- **Critical Thinking**: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- Quantitative and Empirical Literacy: Students will demonstrate the ability to draw
 conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment,
 and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing
 assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams that pertain to Course
 Student Learning Outcome #2 below.
- **Social Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams that pertain to Course Student Learning Outcome #4 below.

Student Success

There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as a guide.

Attendance Procedures

It is imperative that you attend class in order to be successful. You are expected to attend all scheduled classes. Although *it is your responsibility to drop a course for nonattendance*, the instructor has the authority to drop you for excessive absences. You may be dropped from a course prior to the college drop deadline (see academic calendar) once you accumulate absences in excess of 12.5 percent of the total hours of instruction (lecture and lab). For a 3 credit hour lecture class meeting 3 hours per week (48 hours of instruction), you can be dropped after **6 hours of absence** (after missing more than 3 classes). The 6 hours includes accumulated minutes for arriving late to class and leaving class early and lab time missed. In an online class, the equivalent would be failing to turn in assignments for two weeks.
