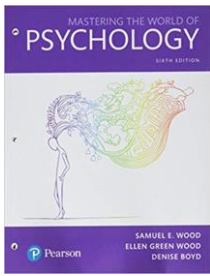

Course Overview

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development, thought processes, and personality.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- **Critical Thinking:** Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills:** Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Quantitative and Empirical Literacy:** Students will demonstrate the ability to draw conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- **Social Responsibility:** Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Exams (440 points)

There will be **5** exams, each worth 100 points of your grade and an Orientation Assessment or Syllabus quiz worth 40 points of your grade. The best 4 out of 5 exams will be graded. They will be multiple choice in format. Each exam has 40 questions. The exams are administered in Canvas. Each exam is 50 minutes. Dates are:

Photo Peach Introduction (25 Points)

Under the discussion category in Canvas, you will go to the Photo Peach Discussion topic and compose an introduction discussion and submit it in Canvas.

Discussions (85 points)

There are 8 discussions. You will post a minimum of 200 word response to Instructor's posting and a 100 word reply to a student's discussion posting. All discussions are available for their corresponding written assignment period.

You must post a response to Instructor's posting and reply to a student's discussion posting to receive credit.

Both are required to receive credit. There is no credit if you do not post to another student's discussion posting.

Written Journal Assignment (100 points)

Research Review. Review a research article from a professional psychological journal or internet source. Possible journals include:

1. Journal of Psychology
2. Journal of Abnormal Psychology
3. Journal of social Psychology
4. Journal of Marriage and Family
5. Journal of Psychology of Personality

The review should be 3-4 typed pages, stapled in upper left corner. The reviews should consist of a summary, description of the type of research, and a critique of the quality of the research. Your instructor has forms that will guide you.

You are required to use a form provided by your instructor to guide you and you must attach a copy of your journal article. Journals must be APA listed and involve experimental research.

****This review will consist of an article and a journal not previously used for the written journal assignment.**

The review should be 3-4 typed pages, stapled in upper left corner. The reviews should consist of a summary, description of the type of research, and a critique of the quality of the research. Your instructor has forms that will guide you.

You are required to use a form provided by your instructor to guide you and you must attach a copy of your journal article. Journals must be APA listed and involve experimental research.

Practice Final Exam

There is a practice final exam located under the category of exams in your Canvas Course. The practice final exam along with the supplementary handbook and power point slide review are tools to help you master the learning objectives for the course. The practice final exam consists of 100 multiple choice questions and has a two-hour time limit. You have unlimited attempts to practice. The practice exam does not count toward your overall course grade.

Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam

All students in PSYC 2301 are required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple-choice questions. All of the information you need to succeed on the exam may be found at <https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources>. The final exam counts 150 points or 15% of your course grade.

The exam will be administered on Canvas with these restrictions:

- Available only on the dates listed in the Course Calendar
- May not be taken early under any circumstances
- Time limit: 120 minutes
- Attempts: 1
- Questions shown one at a time
- After a question has been answered, students cannot return to it.
- Viewing of exam questions and submitted answers is not permitted.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Students who do not submit the final exam by the deadline in the Course Calendar without discussing the matter with their instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward may receive a grade of zero on the exam and, as a result, fail the course. Failure to comply with these instructions will result in not being able to take the final exam and therefore failing the course.

MISSED TEST POLICY

There are no makeup exams. If you miss a test, that test will count as your lowest score. Incomplete Grades
