The Department of English helps students find and develop their authentic voices, establish political power, and create social capital. We teach critical thinking, close reading, and analysis. We coach students on the rhetoric of messaging with consideration of purpose and audience. We support them as they craft their own narratives. We turn thoughts into words, ideas into interpretations, ambiguity into translation, and silence into voice.

Personal Welcome

Welcome to Comp I! With a focus on advertising rhetoric, you will develop further the research and rhetorical skills you need to create academic-worthy research papers and essays in the Humanities and other fields.

Writing IS an ongoing process of thinking, drafting, and revising. It NOT about doing an assignment the night before its due and handing it in, thinking that is enough. Equally as

important as getting a "finished" draft down on paper will be producing a draft that explores an idea, and then changing and refining that draft to better meet your writing goals and your audience's expectations. Finally, we will work on preparing manuscripts that are professional. We will address issues of mechanics, grammar, and presentation in terms of the earned authority of a manuscript, depending on the time and needs of the class.

Learning Management System

This semester, there are three modalities for English courses: Online Anytime, Online on a Schedule, and Flex Campus. Online Anytime classes are traditional online courses; coursework is online, and there are no meetings at specific times. Online on a Schedule classes are online courses with traditional meeting components; coursework is online, and there are specific times to log in for scheduled class meetings. Flex Campus are in-person classes; coursework is online, and students have the choice to come to campus or to participate online during scheduled class meetings.

Course Overview for ENGL 1301

ENGL 1301 is an intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis. Core curriculum course.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs) for all ENGL Core Courses

ENGL 1301 satisfies three (3) hours of the communication requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS English Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- *Critical Thinking*: Students will demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- **Communication**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Personal Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.
- **Teamwork**: Students will demonstrate the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.

Student Success in ENGL

As with any three-hour course, expect to spend **at least six hours per week** outside of class reading and studying the material. I will provide assignments to help you use those six hours per week wisely. Additional time will be required for written assignments. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of reading the textbook, attending class, completing assignments in Eagle Online, and participating in class discussions. There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as your guide.

Instructor and Student Responsibilities

As your Instructor, it is my responsibility to:

- Provide the grading scale and detailed grading formula explaining how student grades are to be calculated
- Facilitate an effective learning environment through class activities, discussions, and lectures
- Provide a description of any assignments
- Inform students of policies

Assignments

Written Assignments and Essays

Students will write a minimum of 5,000 words over the course of the semester.

There will be three major essays over the course of the semester, as well as a mini-essay and discussion posts. Course work will be weighted roughly as follows:

Mini-essay-	10%
Online/Canvas Discussion Boards/ Class Participation -	15%
Major paper #1- Summary Response –	25%
Major paper #2 - Analysis of Two Visual Texts -	25%
Major paper #3 - Synthesis/Analysis Essay -	25%

When revisions are required or allowed for specified assignments, the revised grade will replace the original grade.

NOTE: It is not the instructor's job to continually remind you if you miss a deadline to submit your work. It is your job to get your work in on time. For every day late a paper will be docked five points (out of a possible 100) off the bat, and that is before the paper is graded as to its merits.

In-Class Activities

Throughout the semester, students will have in-class workshops to assist them in developing their Outlines and drafts of the research paper.

Grading Formula

Grading Rubric and Justification

A (90-100%) Excellent work that shows clear understanding of the writing topic, has few errors of any kind, and shows exceptional ability to communicate to a specific audience.

B (80-89%) Above average work that shows understanding of the writing topic, has few serious errors, and provides good communication with a specific audience.

C (70-79%) Average work that shows understanding of the writing topic, contains few errors that interfere with adequate communication.

D (60-69%) Below average work that fails to respond adequately to the writing topic, contains a number of serious errors, and provides only F (0-59%) Work that fails to respond to the writing topic, contains a number of serious errors, and provides little communication with a specific audience.

Note: Please be advised that a grade of "0" will be recorded in the Canvas grade book until the student has submitted his/her assignment. If the student fails to submit his/her assignment, then the "0" shall be permanently recorded in the grade book.

Scholastic Dishonesty/Plagiarism: According to the Student Handbook for the Houston Community College System, scholastic dishonesty includes cheating on a test, plagiarism, and collusion. Since you'll be writing essays in this class, I'll be most concerned with plagiarism, which means using another person's words or ideas and assimilating them into your own written work without quotation marks (if exact words are used) or appropriate acknowledgment if borrowed material is summarized or paraphrased--and collusion--"unauthorized collaboration."

Plagiarism will result in a grade of 0 for the assignment. You will not be allowed to rewrite plagiarized papers.

Attendance Procedure

Even though this is a Flex class, attendance will be still be expected and taken as we have synchronous meetings via video during class time. Discussion board posts will also be taken into account for attendance.

Students are expected to attend class. Students with more than 6 hours of unexcused absence may be dropped for excessive absence at the instructor's discretion; while such withdrawal is not automatic, excessive absence will affect the final grade in any case (see attendance policy under "Professionalism"). Other than religious holidays, only University-sponsored activities count as excused absences. Religious holidays may be excused if the student submits a notice to the instructor stating his or her intention in advance of the absence. Because I know sudden events can happen in any given semester, if a family or

medical emergency (or any other kind of emergency) comes up, let the instructor know and provide documentation if you can.
