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#### COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This is an introductory course in the construction of masks through several techniques. The students will use their creativity to put their own spin on a traditional craft. They will also learn how to apply these skills to earn employment in the theatre or other industries.

#### **INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS**

No textbook required for this class. Supplementary materials will be provided.

## **COURSE GOALS:**

This class is designed to enhance the student's enjoyment and understanding of mask making. It will provide a guide to understanding the steps needed to design, construct, and realize ideas for creating a successful mask.

## COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES (SLO)

- 1. Students will gain an awareness, appreciation, and understanding of the use and ritual of masks in many cultures.
- 2. Students will gain perspective on the characteristics within masks the exaggeration, distortion, and symmetry of elements.
- 3. Students will create sculptural masks by covering underlying structures with paper mache, instant mache, and plaster gauze exhibiting a strong foundation for their mask.
- 4. Students will finalize their thoughts and designs in the creative completion of their mask through details/embellishments, and choice of finishing.

## SCANS (Secretary's Commission on Achieving Necessary Skills)

The U.S. Department of Labor's Secretary's Commission on Achieving Necessary Skills (SCANS) to

enter the workplace determined that specific competencies must be addressed. HCCS is committed to preparing every student with the knowledge and skills needed to succeed in today's work environment. The following competencies will be addressed in this course:

- 1. **Resources** Students will organize, and allocate time, money, and materials. An emphasis will be placed on their planning skills in relation to preparing, working, and completing 8 masks by a deadline.
- 2. **Interpersonal**—Each student will teach the class about masks used in a culture of their choice through a short research paper and interpretations of this in 2 masks they make. In discussions for final presentation they will emphasize their personal lessons and challenges of the activities.
- 3. **Information** Students are required to acquire information through magazines, internet, visits to museums, etc. They are expected to organize this information as a guide for their masks.
- 4. **Systems**—Students are expected to monitor and correct their personal performance, and know how to improve in their future attempts.
- **5. Technology**—Students should use computers as a source for inspiration of masks they would like to attempt to make, find instructional videos for embellishing, etc.

The three SCANS foundation skills identified by the Commission are the following:

- 1. Basic Skills—Reading, writing, mathematics, listening, and speaking.
- 2. Thinking Skills—Students need to think critically and creatively so that they may adjust to changes they may encounter when 1<sup>st</sup> solution may not work. Students will stretch their minds and find new answers while turning their design ideas into concrete physical objects.
- **3. Personal Qualities**—Responsibility, self-esteem, sociability, self-management, and integrity. Throughout their lives, students will need to get along with others: with classmates, friends and family, customers, and coworkers. Collaboration and brainstorming is encouraged. We are all in this together!

## CLASS ATTENDANCE IS IMPORTANT.

# **INSTRUCTOR GRADING CRITERIA**

Come to class. Follow directions. Be creative! If you can manage this, a good grade is assured.

### STUDENT ASSIGNMENTS

**I want you to complete 6 masks by the end of the course**. It may seem like a lot, but it works out to 2 per instructional class/ technique. To secure jobs or make money selling creations you have to learn how

to produce multiples and in a swift manner. This is cost effective and will yield a higher profit margin in the end.

Mask themes needed:

1 animal 1 fairytale character 1 Venetian inspired 1 plastic mask transformed

1 ethnic inspired mask. I want you to research the culture you chose so you can share with the class in your final critique. Talk about common themes in the culture, colors, symbolism, etc. How are masks used in that culture? A brief typed summary to turn in to me. Most museums have cultural masks in permanent exhibits, go get inspired by real life not just behind a computer screen!!!!

1 remaining masks you can do whatever subject you choose! (All masks should have 3 dimensional features such as eyebrows, ears, etc- not just flat masks).

You will also need to turn in a mask specification sheet for one of your masks (I will provide this sheet) This will include a sketch of one mask (to show where it covers the face), swatches of fabrics trims, paints used, any details for design used along with estimated completion time. Also include any inspiration research (photos of style, shape, color themes, texture ideas, etc)

## **Project Evaluation:**

The final critique of all your masks will be graded based in the following manner:

25% Completion (Completion of all 6 masks in the assigned categories)
20% Neatness, clarity (Are the masks presentable and a clear reflection of ideas)

20% Creativity (Is your design thought out and interesting?)

20% Practicality (Is the mask designed to be worn or hung? Could it be sold?)

15% Presentation (Expression of your journey in this class, understanding of culture you

chose)

### **Instructor Evaluation:**

- 1. Did students exhibit an awareness/understanding of masks from various cultures?
- 2. Did students integrate planning into their own mask design? Need to map out plan.
- 3. Did students break the form with added sculptural relief?
- 4. Did students exhibit craftsmanship in applying layers of paper maché?
- 5. Did students complete design creativity in finishing their mask and applying embellishments?

#### **Student Presentation:**

- 1. Describe our masks one by one. (What you made and how, why, and the materials you used.)
- 2. Describe one new thing you learned through making this mask, or looking at and discussing the masks from various cultures.
- 3. Describe how you have communicated a specific idea through making this mask.
- 4. Describe what you enjoyed the most about this project and the least.
- 5. If you were to do this project again, what might you change to make it more successful?

### MAKE-UP TESTS & ASSIGNMENT POLICY:



Deadlines are VERY important. As they say, "the show must go on. " LATE ASSIGNMENTS ARE UNACCEPTABLE!!!

All masks will be due the final day of class. **If an extreme circumstance occurs contact me immediately**. Grades are turned in that last day of class, and if you do not alert me you will fail for missing the final critique. 15% of your project grade is the presentation to the class, so if you miss critique, you will not be able to make an A.

#### General Rules

- 1. Sign-in each class. Late students need to put the time in which they are arriving. Don't think I won't notice, I will pay close attention to arrivals and keep my own log as well. NO EXCUSES!!!
- 2. No food or drinks in the classroom. Students are only allowed close cap drinks. If you need to take a break to grab a snack you are allowed to take when needed after lecture is done.
- 3. Return all supplies to their respective places. (mask forms to dry in cabinet)
- 4. Each student is in charge of their table area. When finished for the day, clean assigned area, wipe down table, sweep if needed, and push chairs under the table. Points will be deducted from class participation grade if area is not maintained.
- 5. Label all supplies. It is your responsibility to keep up with your items.
- 6. No talking on cell phone during class hours. They must be turned off or put on silent. Points will be deducted for interruption. If there is an emergency, please be discrete and go outside.
- 7. **NO CHILDREN** of any age is allowed in classroom at any time as there are industrial equipment in the classroom which can cause serious injuries. This rule is also in the Houston Community College handbook. Also do not bring friends to class. We are limited on space as it is!

- 10. Always place the iron on the silicone plate, face-down when not in use. Do not leave it anywhere else on the ironing board or it with burn.
