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## COURSE DESCRIPTION

Fundamentals of fabric design. Instruction in dye methods for various types of fabrics. Resist pattern techniques: rubber band, knot, stitched, clamped, and Arashi shibori. Silkscreen pattern development, fabric printing, and hand painting.

## LEARNING OBJECTIVES

1. Students identify fabrics and correct dye product to alter that fiber type.
2. Students will be able to look at a garment and identify what techniques were used to achieve the fabric's overall appearance.
3. Students will test and observe multiple dye methods on fabrics. Evaluating results that they like and dislike, and understand how to reproduce design again if needed.
4. Students will use fabrics created in class and transform into a final product through sewing or other method.
5. Students will develop color theory into fabric manipulation.

Class participation includes arriving with all materials necessary to work for the entire class, completing any prep work, and any homework assigned.

Attendance means coming to class ON TIME and staying for the whole class.
Critiques are a show and tell of what you have done in class, AND AT HOME. (You are expected to work at home at least 7 hours per week, the same amount of time you spend in class.) You are required to dye one continuous 3 yard piece of fabric a solid color FLAWLESSLY by the end of the semester. It can be whatever fiber you choose. AND silkscreen an entire 3 yard piece, this can be done on top of the solid color you dye. As for the bulk of your critique work, that is up to you. I do not assign the same project or assignment for the whole class. I want you to explore your strengths and interests. This makes for a much more enjoyable semester. You are expected to create your own goals and individual projects like a designer would. This can include fabrics/yardages alone and ones sewn up into finished projects. You can organize a swatch book of dyes/techniques on different fibers that you will build upon the entire semester; this is an invaluable resource for the future. The list can go on and on, let yourself create!

## Make-up policy

Students are responsible for turning in all work assigned. Deadlines are VERY important in the fashion world. This class should be treated with same importance as a job.

## LATE CRITIQUES ARE UNACCEPTABLE!!!

If something is going on LET ME KNOW! You will get a lot of positive and constructive criticism in these critiques that are in valuable, so do not miss out. And do not bring things wet! We want to see everything pressed and presentable.

## CLASS ATTENDANCE IS IMPORTANT.

It is the policy of the department that there are no excused absences. Just as in the workforce, students absent from class are still responsible for all material assigned and/or covered during the missed session. Attending class lectures is vital to understanding, and applying the concepts discussed in class. Generally, if a text is required for the course, the course material is covered in the text; however, lectures, exercises, and assignments augment and clarify the textbook material. You are encouraged to get to know your fellow students in order to have a source for lecture notes and handouts if you cannot attend a class session. Critiques can contain work done in class... but it should only be part of what you turn in. This means if you turn in 10 items 3 or maybe 4 can come from in class work. By the end of the semester you will be required to dye one solid 3 yard piece of whatever fabric you choose, and then silkscreen the same or an additional 3 yard piece.

Remember the more you produce, the better your skill level will become!!!

## FABRIC DESIGN SUPPLY LIST

I am aware this class is very expensive, and it can be overwhelming to buy everything all at once. I have broken down the supply list class by class so your budgets won't be exhausted in one shopping trip!!! I also will give any tips I have as to saving money. Leaving it to the last minute is the worst thing you can do, so shop around before purchasing. There are deals out there on a lot of these items, and you may have a bunch already at home -

## All Classes:

1. Fabrics, garments, scarves, etc. MUST be $100 \%$ Cellulose or protein fibers only! (ex.wool, silk, cotton, linen, rayon, nylon). Also it can be a blend of any of these or any natural fiber.
NO POLYESTER AT ALL...NOT EVEN A LITTLE PERCENTAGE...DON'T BRING POLYESTER TO CLASS!!! EVER!!! NO SYNTHETICS!!!
2. RIT dye (liquid or powder form) or iDYE for natural fibers only!!
3. Procion MX cold water dye
4. Jacquard acid dye
5. Salt
6. Vinegar
7. Soda ash
8. Gloves
9. Apron
10. Particle mask (can buy one and reuse)
11. 2 Drop cloths: thick plastic sheeting, vinyl tablecloth, shower curtain AND Large fabric one
12. Towels (3 min per class!)
13. Plastic grocery bags, Ziploc bags for swatches in beginning
14. Butane stove AND several gas refills per class
15. Large stainless steel pot (8quart): NO ALUMINUM!!!
16. Plastic tub
17. Stainless steel measuring spoons and large spoons for stirring dye bath
18. Scrubbing bubbles
19. Scissors

## 3rd class (Knot resist/ rubberband resist/modeling):

20. Rubberbands
21. String: different thicknesses and material will yield different results
22. Pantyhose, or knee highs

## $4^{\text {th }}$ class (Clamped resist and stitched resist):

23. Buttonhole thread, really strong sewing thread, or embroidery floss.
24. Hand sewing needles
25. C clamps or squeeze clamps large, and various other sizes if you like. Clothespins work well too for a small scale design.

26. Wood cut outs, metal pieces, need to have 2 of the same shape and size. I will provide a set for the class)

## $6^{\text {th }}$ and $7^{\text {th }}$ class (Arashi Shibori):

27. PVC pole: 1-2 ft long, 6-8 inches in diameter
28. STRONG string, cord or rope.
29. Paintbrushes, sponges, droppers, squeeze bottle, tips.
30. Urea
31. Sodium Alginate (Thickener) SH
32. Plastic to go containers with lids or jars with lids.
33. Plastic spoon
$8^{\text {th }}$ class (Silkscreen prep):
34. $\$ 45$ for screen
35. Xeroxes of images for silkscreen
36. Plain white copy paper
37. Transparent tape
38. White out pen and/or sponge applicator
39. Black Sharpie marker
$10^{\text {th }}$ class (silkscreen):
40. Squeegee
41. Fabric Paint (jacquard, speedball. NO PUFF PAINT!!!)
42. Masking tape $2 "$ wide and other sizes if you want.
43. Copy paper to mask off areas.
$11^{\text {th }}$ class (silkscreen with thickened dye):
44. Urea
45. Sodium Alginate (thickener) SH
46. Plastic to go containers with lids or jars with lids.
47. Plastic spoon

The above are the required items, use your imagination on how you can create other textures and patterns. Be inspired when you are in stores and don't be afraid to experiment! :)
