Course Description:	An enriched, integrated pre-service course and content experience that provides an overview of schooling and classrooms from the perspectives of language, gender, socioeconomic status, ethnic and academic diversity, and equity with an emphasis on factors that facilitate learning. The course provides students with opportunities to participate in early field observations of P-12 special populations and should be aligned as applicable with State Board for Educator Certification Pedagogy and Professional Responsibilities standards. <u>Must include a minimum of 16 contact hours of field experience in P-12 classrooms with special</u>

populations.

Academic Discipline/CTE Program Learning Outcomes	 Students will explain the purposes of schooling and contexts of classrooms with an emphasis on the characteristics of exceptional students in the regular and special education classroom. Students will analyze and evaluate teacher preparation programs, effective teaching strategies, their own employability, and the role of educators as they decide whether teaching could be a satisfying career for them. Students will describe the characteristics of a specific type of exceptional learner including pre-referral interventions that should or could be used, modifications that must be made after referral, and legal implications. Students will explore, examine, and evaluate one of the current issues affecting the field of education today, such as instructional methods, learning, curriculum, students, teachers, families, administration, school policy, or school law.
