

Course Overview

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development, thought processes, and personality.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- **Critical Thinking**: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Quantitative and Empirical Literacy**: Students will demonstrate the ability to draw conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- **Social Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Student Success

Assignments, Exams, and Activities

Please carefully review all of the information in this section and don't hesitate to ask questions if anything is unclear to you. Be assured that I have thoughtfully designed all of the assignments, exams, and activities in this course to enable you to learn the material and to be successful. By providing due dates, I am helping you stay on track and accomplish your goal of getting the best grade you can in this course.

Written Assignment(s)

To facilitate your learning in this class, you will be completing a four-part Psychology Journal. This is NOT a research paper. This journal is meant to be reflective; this means that you are going to relate the concepts in this class to your own life. This journal will also help you better understand concepts covered on the Departmental Final Exam. The instructions are as follows:

- 1. Go look at the Final Exam Handbook posted on CANVAS.
- 2. Choose ONE (1) concept you find relevant to your life.
- 3. Find the definition of that concept in your textbook.
- 4. Using APA format, quote and cite the textbook on that concept.
- 5. Separate from your definition, write a 100-word paragraph (max 200 words) about how this concept relates to your life. Examples for how a concept relates to your life includes but is not limited to:
 - a. Where in your life have you seen examples of this concept?
 - b. Have you seen anyone in your family or circle of friends exhibit behavior covered in the text?
 - c. How does a concept remind you of how your family or friends have interacted with you?
- 6. Be sure to proofread your essay! You will lose points if you have grammatical or spelling errors.
- 7. Refer to the rubric and template as a guide for completing your essay.
- 8. Type your assignment directly into the text box under the assignment submission page in CANVAS.

To be successful in the course, your Psychology Journal must include four (4) entries. Each entry will be worth 50 points each. All four entries together are worth 200 points (20% of your final course grade). The due dates for the Journal Entries are in the course calendar in this syllabus.

I only take off up to 10% off for grammar mistakes, so while you should do your best to use proper grammar, what is more important is that you use your own words and do your own work on these essays. Do not take other people's work and pass it off as your own.

Exams

There are five exams in this class.

- There are 50 multiple-choice questions on each exam.
- Each exam is worth 100 points.
- You can earn up to 500 points out of 1,000. This translates to 50% of your course grade.
- Remember, this class is graded on points, NOT averages!
- The exams will help you to prepare for the departmental final exam and will be based on the objectives in the Final Exam Handbook.
- In this class, ALL exams will take place on Canvas:
- You will have 75 minutes (an hour and fifteen minutes) for each exam.
- You will have ONE attempt at each exam.
- You will see one question at a time.
- Questions will be locked after answering, no backtracking allowed.
- Exam results can be reviewed after your finish your exam.
- Correct answers will NOT be provided.
- Once you hit "Submit Quiz," your exam will be submitted and you will NOT be allowed to take the exam again.

Exams will be available according to the schedule in the course calendar.

In-Class Activities

In this class, while there are in-class activities that are not graded, they are to help you gain a better understanding of the content. These activities will include class discussion. There may also be other unannounced in-class activities that are not graded.

Practice Final Exam

You are required to take a 154-item practice final exam. You will have three hours to take the practice final exam, and you are allowed two attempts. Each item is worth 1 point. The Practice Final Exam will count to 100 points. The remaining 54 points you earn will be your extra credit for this course. The practice final exam will take place on Canvas.

Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam

All students in PSYC 2301 are required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple-choice questions. All of the information you need to succeed on the exam may be found at https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources. The Departmental Final Exam is worth 200 points. <u>The raw score of up to 100 will be multiplied by 2 in the gradebook</u>. I will manually multiply the score after the final exam is over.

The exam will be administered on Canvas with these restrictions:

- a. Available only on the dates listed in the Course Calendar
- b. May not be taken early under any circumstances
- c. Time limit: 120 minutes
- d. Attempts: 1
- e. Questions shown one at a time
- f. After a question has been answered, students cannot return to it.
- g. Viewing of exam questions and submitted answers is not permitted.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Students who are absent from the final exam must discuss their absence with the instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward. If you do not take your final exam and you do not discuss your absence with me within 24 before or after the exam, you will earn a 0 for the comprehensive final exam.

Grading Formula

This course is graded on a points-based grading system with a maximum 1,000 total points possible. Calculate your grade by adding up all your points together. On Canvas in your gradebook, focus on the current number of points you have. Everyone starts off at 0, so do your best to earn as many points as you can! In this class, you can earn UP TO 54 points of

extra credit, which comes from the 54 points after the base 100 points from the Practice Final.

Missed Assignments
