What's Exciting About This Course

Psychology is about improving the human condition. How can you not be excited about that? This course is an introduction to psychology--this means you will learn "a little about a lot" of the concepts in psychology. You will be introduced to a wide variety of topics including how we learn new things, why we remember or forget, and how our brain and body affects our mind. We will learn about stress and health, psychological disorders and theories about how we turn out the way we turn out. At the end of the semester, you will be able to read minds and manipulate friends to squawk like chickens. Not really. Not even close. However, you will learn information that will help you understand more about yourself and others. Most students tell me they learn at least one thing (usually more) in this class that has already helped them in their life.]

PSYC 2301 requires college-level reading and writing skills. Research indicates that you are most likely to succeed if you have already taken and passed ENGL 1301. The minimum requirements for enrollment in PSYC 2301 include placement in college-level reading (or take INRW 0420 or ESOL 0360 as a co-requisite). If you have enrolled in this course having satisfied these prerequisites, you have a higher chance of success than students who have not done so. Course Overview

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development, thought processes, and personality.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- **Critical Thinking:** Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills:** Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Quantitative and Empirical Literacy:** Students will demonstrate the ability to draw conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- **Social Responsibility:** Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness,

intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Written Assignment(s)

Written Assignment—How to Get the Most Out of Studying (worth 50 points)

Go to Canvas and watch the 6 videos on How to Get the Most Out of Studying.

List the top ten study tips you learned from Dr. Chew's video series. For full credit you must do the following:

1. Include at least one tip from each video (you will have more than one tip from a few of the videos--make sure you have one from each video). State which video the tip comes from in the first sentence of each tip.
2. List and number the 10 items (do not write them in a paragraph--list down the page like I am doing here).
3. Use proper grammar, punctuation and spelling. Use complete sentences. Use more than one sentence per tip.
4. Make the list easy to read and easy to understand.
5. Elaborate each concept so that anyone reading can understand what you are saying. For example, don't use the word "meta-cognition" or "deep processing" without explaining what it is. Use more than one sentence per tip.

Written Assignment—Grit (worth 100 points)

For this assignment, you are to watch the following TED talk

And answer the following questions following the format described below:

1. What is grit as defined by Angela Duckworth? Your answer needs to be at least three sentences or more.
2. What is your grit score? Take this [quiz](#). Use at least two sentences to explain how this score does/does not fit you and why.
3. Describe a time that you overcame an obstacle that seemed impossible at the start. Explain what you did to reach your goal.
4. Explain how you will use this information about grit to help you succeed in your education and your career.

Directions for writing your paper:

1. Title your paper (you can be creative as long as you are accurate.)
2. Include all questions along with your answers. Number and state the question. Provide your answer below the question.
3. Bold the number and question. Put a space between paragraphs and between questions. Use a non-bolded, non-italicized font for the answer.
4. Use proper grammar and punctuation.
5. Be thorough and thoughtful. A C is average work. If you want an A or B, you need to be above average (B) or way above average (A).
6. Do not plagiarize. Familiarize yourself with plagiarism so you know what it is and how to avoid it.

6. You must use TurnItIn. This will help you avoid plagiarism. It will also give you feedback on your grammar. If TurnItIn gives you an orange or red flag, this strongly suggests you have plagiarized. Rewrite your paper.

Exams

This course includes 4 unit exams to be taken online in your Canvas course.

- Unit exams are comprised of 50 multiple choice questions worth 2 points per question.
- You will have 90 minutes to complete each exam.
- Each exam must be completed in one-sitting.
- You will see only one question at a time.
- You will not be able to go back to previous questions.
- You will be able to view responses but not the correct answers.
- You will have 3 attempts prior to the due date. Highest score is kept.
- You must download and use Respondus Lockdown Browser. Instructions in Canvas.
- Each exam is worth 100 points.

- All exams are open at the beginning of the semester but must be completed by the due date.

- No make-up exams.
- Exams completed after the due date will lose 25 points per day late.

Other Assignments and Activities

You will have graded Canvas assignments that total 150 points of your grade. This includes a syllabus/course quiz that you must be completed with a perfect score in order to open the rest of the Canvas modules. You will also have chapter quizzes, discussions, and written assignments.]

Practice Final Exam

You will take a practice exam in preparation for the final exam. The practice final exam will be identical to the final exam, with different questions.

You will take this online in your Canvas course.

- There will be 100 multiple choice questions worth 1 point per question.
- You will have 120 minutes to complete the exam.
- Exam must be completed in one-sitting.
- You will see only one question at a time.
- You will not be able to go back to previous questions.
- You will be able to view responses but not the correct answers (not able to do this on your Final Exam).
- You will have 3 attempts (your Final Exam will only have 1 attempt)—keep highest score.
- Exam is worth 100 points.

The exam is open at the beginning of the semester but must be completed by the due date. See the course schedule and Canvas for due date.

No make-up exams.

Exam completed after the due date will lose 25 points per day late.

Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam

All students in PSYC 2301 are required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple-choice questions. All of the information you need to succeed on the exam may be found at <https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources>. **Each question is worth 2 points for a total of 200 points.**

The exam will be administered on Canvas with these restrictions:

- a. Available only on the dates listed in the Course Calendar
- b. May not be taken early under any circumstances
- c. Time limit: 120 minutes
- d. Attempts: 1
- e. Questions shown one at a time
- f. After a question has been answered, students cannot return to it.
- g. Viewing of exam questions and submitted answers is not permitted.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Students who do not submit the final exam by the deadline in the Course Calendar without discussing the matter with their instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward may receive a grade of zero on the exam and, as a result, fail the course. If you do not take the exam you will fail this course. If you do not earn 50% or higher on this exam, you will fail this course.
