Course Overview

PSYC 2306 is a psychology course designed to provide an understanding of human sexuality, identity, orientation, behavior, and the variations in these dimensions of this important aspect of human experience. This course includes information on physical, cognitive, and psychosocial changes associated with sexuality. Theory, research methods and applications of research to the facilitation of gender identity development, understanding the human sexual response, providing information on the treatment of sexual dysfunction, and the preventing of sexually transmitted diseases and irresponsible sexual behavior are covered. (PSYC 2301 is not included in the Psychology Field of Study.)

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301, PSYC 2314, PSYC 2316, and PSYC 2319 satisfy the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Program Committee has specified that these courses address the core objectives as follows:

- Critical Thinking: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- Quantitative and Empirical Literacy: Students will demonstrate the ability to draw

- conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- **Social Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Written Assignment(s)

You will have written assignments that correspond with chapters as we cover them.

Written assignments will be completed using Canvas.

Assignments will be worth 5 to 20 points for a total of 200 points.

All assignments are available at the beginning of the semester but must be completed by the due date.

Assignments completed after the due date will lose 25% per day late.

Grading Rubric for assignments is as follows (based on a 10-point assignment):

- Thoughtful and thorough answer = 10 points
- Answered but lacking info, detail, or thought = 5 points
- Grammar, spelling, punctuation errors = -1 point up to 5 points
- Late—turned in after due date = -2.5 points per day
- Did not include numbers and questions with answers = -5 points.

Exams

This course includes 4 unit exams to be taken online in your Canvas course.

- Unit exams are comprised of 75 multiple choice questions worth 2 points each.
- You will have 90 minutes to complete each exam.
- Each exam must be completed in one-sitting.
- You will see only one question at a time.

- You can go back to a question.
- You will be able to view responses but not the correct answers.
- Each exam is worth 150 points
- Your lowest of the 4 exams will be dropped
- All exams are open at the beginning of the semester but must be completed by the due date.

- No make-up exams
- Unlimited attempts before the due date. High score is kept.
- Exams completed after the due date will lose 37.5 points per day late.

In-Class Activities

In class activities such as debates, class discussions, and small group discussions will be graded for a maximum of 200 points. At times, you will be asked to complete work in Canvas and bring to class for discussion. You may also be asked to give a small group presentation. You will be graded on attendance, following directions, quality of participation (asks/answers questions, makes relevant comments, thoughtful and thorough), and respect to all. You will be expected to appear attentive to lectures by keeping all devices closed (unless told otherwise). See Canvas for specific instructions and grading rubrics.

Comprehensive Final Exam

There will be a comprehensive final exam in this course. The exam will be administered in Canvas (See Course Calendar for availability and due dates). You will have 120 minutes to complete the exam with unlimited attempts allowed before the due date. You will have 100 questions worth 1.5 points each. Questions will be viewed one at a time. Exams taken after the due date will lose 37.5 points (25%) per day late.

Students who are absent from the final exam must discuss their absence with the instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward. If you do not complete the exam by the end of the semester you will earn a 0 for the exam.

Missed Assignments

Assignments completed after the due date will be deducted 25% per day. You will not earn points on assignments turned in 4 days after the due date. Your lowest exam grade is dropped. There are no makeup exams.

Academic Integrity
