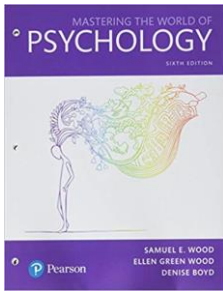

Course Overview

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development,

thought processes, and personality.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- **Critical Thinking:** Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills:** Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Quantitative and Empirical Literacy:** Students will demonstrate the ability to draw conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- **Social Responsibility:** Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Paper and pencil exams will be given over chapters 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13. Each exam will contain 30 multiple choice questions with a short essay response at the end for a possible 10 bonus points. The test will be given in class within the 90 minute period. The average of all exams will be 30% of your grade.

Practice Final Exam

To help you get ready for the final exam, I will require you to take a practice final exam. This will count as a test grade. (your score will be 5% of your grade) The exam is 154 multiple-choice questions. It will be given in class during two 90 minute periods.

Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam

All students will be required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple-choice questions. All the information students need to prepare for the exam is in the <https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources>. The exam will be administered in class on the date shown in the Course Calendar. Students must provide their own Scantron forms (FORM NUMBER 882-E-LOVAS). The final exam ***may not be taken early under any circumstances.*** The exam will count for **25%** of your grade.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Students who are absent from the final exam must discuss their absence with the instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward. Students who are unable to complete the final exam in accordance with the Course Calendar should notify me in advance. Student who do not do so may receive a grade of zero on the exam and, as a result, fail the course..
