Course Overview for INRW 0300

INRW 0300 is a corequisite course in support of ENGL 1301, which is an intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis. Core curriculum course.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs) for all Courses

INRW 0300 is a support course paired with ENGL 1301, which satisfies three (3) hours of the communication requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS English Discipline Committee and the INRW Discipline Committee have specified that ENGL 1301 and INRW 0300 address the following core objectives:

- *Critical Thinking*: Students will demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- **Communication**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Personal Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.
- **Teamwork**: Students will demonstrate the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.

Student Success in INRW 0300

As with any three-hour course, expect to spend **at least six hours per week** outside of class reading and studying the material. I will provide assignments to help you use those six hours per week wisely. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of reading the assigned readings, attending class, completing assignments in Eagle Online, and participating in class discussions. There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading), studying the material, and working on writing skills, using the course objectives as your guide.

Written Assignments and Essays

The three essays you complete in ENGL 1301 will be the major part of this grade, but the percentages will be a bit different in the grading formula (see below). In addition, you will complete one brief presentation and one short essay for the reading culture scholarship program related to the book, Black Sugar.

In this course, the first violation of academic integrity, including but not limited to collusion and plagiarism, will result in a 0 for the assignment. The second violation will result in an F for the course and a referral to the appropriate Dean of Student Services.

Attendance Procedure

Attendance, preparedness, and participation are essential for your success in this course. HCC does not differentiate between excused and unexcused absences. If you are not in class, you are absent; if you are in class and fail to participate, you are absent; if you arrive to class more than 20 minutes late or leave more than 20 minutes early, you are absent.

HCC Policy states that you can miss up to but not exceeding 12.5% of class hours, which is equivalent to 6 hours. When you miss class, you are still responsible for what happens that day. If you know you must be absent or if you have an emergency, let me know **before class** and make plans to meet with me in office hours. If you have more than four (4) absences before the official date of record (September 9), you will be withdrawn from the course.

Please note: If you are dropped from ENGL 1301 for attendance, you will also be dropped from this class and vice versa.

Student Conduct

Our shared responsibility is to develop and maintain a positive learning environment for everyone. I take this responsibility seriously and will inform members of the class if their behavior makes it difficult for me to carry out this task. As a fellow learner, you are asked to respect the learning needs of your classmates and to help me achieve this critical goal.

You will be engaging with your peers in the discussion forums and during peer review. You might encounter ideas that are different from yours. I expect you to be courteous and respectful to your peers at all times. Failure to do so will result in a referral to the appropriate Dean of Student Services and possible dismissal from the course.

Students often communicate with me frequently via email. Please include your name and course number in all email communications, along with an appropriate greeting and correct spelling. These are the basics of written communication but are often lost in online writing. In addition, use your HCC email or Canvas email to contact me; I will not respond to emails sent via outside email addresses.

Instructor's Course-Specific Information

Information on essay submission: Each essay that you submit will have a rough draft, peer review, final draft, and reflection.

All major assignments, both rough and final drafts, must be completed to pass the course. You will submit both rough and final drafts of all essays and complete peer review through Turnitin.com (see registration information on Canvas). When you submit an essay to Turnitin.com, you will receive a confirmation email to the email address you provided; if you do not receive this email, your essay has not been submitted. Make sure to follow the manuscript guidelines for all formal essays and meet the length requirements (as posted on the assignment sheet in Canvas). If you miss peer review, you will lose 10 points from the final essay grade; to recover those points, you will submit your essay through Upswing.

Information on late work: Late daily work will not be accepted. Late essays will be penalized 10 points per day for three calendar days, after which you will receive a 0 on the assignment.

Standard deductions

- -10: late rough draft per day
- -10: rough draft not meeting length requirement
- -10: failure to peer review
- -10: late final draft per day for three days
- -10: final draft not meeting length requirement

- -5: incorrect format
- -5: per source missing from final essay (for essays requiring sources)

ONE EXCEPTION: One time during the course of the semester, you will be allowed to rewrite an essay that earned a grade you are not satisfied with. In order to resubmit, you have to submit both drafts on time, you have to complete peer review, and you have to meet the length requirements for all drafts. You can <u>only</u> use this option for the critical analysis and the annotated bibliography.
