Course Overview for INRW 0300

INRW 0300 is a corequisite course in support of ENGL 1301, which is an intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis. Core curriculum course.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs) for all Courses

INRW 0300 is a support course paired with ENGL 1301, which satisfies three (3) hours of the communication requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS English Discipline Committee and the INRW Discipline Committee have specified that ENGL 1301 and INRW 0300 address the following core objectives:

- *Critical Thinking*: Students will demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- **Communication**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Personal Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.
- **Teamwork**: Students will demonstrate the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.

Student Success in INRW 0300

As with any three-hour course, expect to spend **at least six hours per week** outside of class reading and studying the material. I will provide assignments to help you use those six hours per week wisely. Additional time will be required for written assignments. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of reading the textbook, attending class, completing assignments, and participating in class discussions. There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as your guide.

The essays you write for this course will be the same as the essays you write for ENGL 1301. In theory, the grade you earn in 0300 will be very similar to the grade you earn in 1301. The only difference is that you will do supplemental daily activities that will count toward your daily / homework grade in this class only.

Diagnostic Essay: no points but required to stay in the course

Critical Analysis: 25%

Annotated Bibliography: 30%

Media Analysis: 25%

Discussion Board Posts / Journals / Quizzes: 15%

Grammar Bytes Assignments: 5%

In this course, the first violation of academic integrity, including but not limited to collusion and plagiarism, will result in a 0 for the assignment. The second violation will result in an F for the course and a referral to the appropriate Dean of Student Services.

Attendance Procedure

HCC policy states that a student may not miss more than 12.5% of class, which is four class meetings in a regular, 16-week semester. Because of the shortened timeline and nature of the online course, in this class, if you fail to log <u>and</u> complete work for more than four days, you will be dropped from the course for failure to participate.

In addition, you will have three assignments (the meet / greet discussion, the syllabus quiz, and the diagnostic essay) to complete by the end of the day on July 15. All three are found in Canvas. Failure to complete both will result in automatic withdrawal from the course.

Student Conduct

Our shared responsibility is to develop and maintain a positive learning environment for everyone. I take this responsibility seriously and will inform members of the class if their behavior makes it difficult for me to carry out this task. As a fellow learner, you are asked to respect the learning needs of your classmates and to help me achieve this critical goal.

You will be engaging with your peers in the discussion forums and during peer review. You might encounter ideas that are different from yours. I expect you to be courteous and respectful to your peers at all times. Failure to do so will result in a referral to the appropriate Dean of Student Services and possible dismissal from the course.

To ensure respectful, appropriate engagement, we will follow these guidelines:

1. Listen more than you speak (or, in this case, think more than you type).

- 2. Enter as a learner.
- 3. Speak from your own experience.
- 4. Assume good will, but remember that intent does not ever equal impact. Attend to impact.

Since this is an online course, you will be communicating with me frequently via email. Please include your name and course number in all email communications, along with an appropriate greeting and correct spelling. These are the basics of written communication but are often lost in online writing. In addition, use your HCC email or Canvas email to contact me; I will not respond to emails sent via outside email addresses.

Instructor Policies

Information on essay submission: Each essay that you submit will have a rough draft, peer review, final draft, and reflection.

All major essay assignments, both rough and final drafts, must be completed to pass the course. You will submit both rough and final drafts of all essays and complete peer review through the assignment submission box in Canvas. Make sure to follow the manuscript guidelines for all formal essays and meet the length requirements (as posted on the assignment sheet in Canvas). If you miss peer review, you will lose 10 points from the final essay grade.

Information on late work: Late daily work will not be accepted. It is your responsibility to make sure the essays have been submitted, so double check. You could even take a screen shot or picture of submitted assignments just in case. Both rough and final drafts of late essays will be penalized 10 points per day for three calendar days, after which you will receive a 0 on the assignment.

Standard deductions

- -10: late rough draft per day for three days
- -10: rough draft not meeting length requirement
- -10: failure to peer review
- -10: late final draft per day for three days
- -10: final draft not meeting length requirement
- -5: incorrect format
- -5: per source missing from final essay (for essays requiring sources)
