

Due to the required hands on p[ortion of the class, you will need some simple art supplies:

Plain White paper (printer paper is fine)

### **Course Overview**

ARTS 1301 is a general introduction to the visual arts designed to create an appreciation of the vocabulary, media, techniques, and purposes of the creative process. Students will critically interpret and evaluate works of art within formal, cultural, and historical contexts (ACGM).

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The course modality of this class is online Anytime.

Faculty will instruct this class as a traditional online course utilizing Canvas Eagle Online.

Attendance will be taken through completion of online assignments.

### **Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)**

ARTS 1301 satisfies the creative arts requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Visual Art Program Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

**Critical Thinking**: [HCC: to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry and analysis, synthesis of information]

Art Appreciation is an investigation and analysis of the styles and modes of artistic production from prehistoric times to our own. Through the study of artistic media, universal themes are explored, and students will develop an appreciation for the creative process as one that represents an evolving synthesis of cultural, personal, and technological influences. Assessment of critical thinking in course work will count for no less than 10% of the final grade.

**Communication Skills**: [HCC: to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication]
Art Appreciation students will learn to interpret the language of visual communication through the study of selected artworks and creation of their own hands-on art project. Students will demonstrate effective writing skills as they fulfill instructor specific writing assignments. In addition, students will develop verbal communication skills as they participate in discussions, critiques and presentations throughout the semester. Assessment of verbal and written communication in course work will count for no less than 10% of the final grade and may be combined with other core assignments.

**Teamwork:** [HCC: to include the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal]

In Art Appreciation courses we use discussions, critiques, group assignments and hands-on art projects to analyze artistic production within various cultures and time periods. This exploration of culture through art allows students to connect with a variety of viewpoints and then exchange viewpoints with others. Students will demonstrate their ability to work effectively with others in class as they safely and responsibly manage shared media, tools, equipment and clean-up duties, as applicable. Each semester students will participate in at least one collaborative assignment designed to expand their experience in developing skills essential to working effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal. Assessment of teamwork activities and assignments will count for no less than 10% of the final grade and may be combined with other core assignments.

**Social Responsibility**: [HCC: to include intercultural competency, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities]

By its very nature Art Appreciation is intercultural. As a subject it explores various historical, political, economic, theological, sociological, and ethnic contexts. Using this framework, students consider the community's responsibility in such issues as art destruction/defacement and restoration, art acquisition and public display, public funding of art and censorship. Students observe current events and how they influence or change art history, as new discoveries may change our perception about art. Students make use of the local art community (including museums, galleries, etc.) to augment their knowledge of and participation in their community. Assessment of social responsibility activities and assignments will count for no less than 10% of the final grade and may be combined with other core assignments.

### **Student Success**

Expect to spend at least twice as many hours per week outside of class as you do in class studying the course content. Additional time will be required for written assignments, visual projects and to prepare group presentations. The assignments provided will help you use your study hours wisely. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of the following:

- Reading the textbook
- Attending class in person and/or online
- Completing assignments
- Participating in class activities

There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as your guide.

# Assignments, Exams, and Activities

### **Written Assignment**

At least 2000 words in written assignment are required. There will be one major graded writing assignment, and written work may be part of the requirements for projects, presentations, and tests. The graded assignment will be a researched, Art History-related essay that you will write in preparation for your presentation, and will be worth 100 points.

Additional requirements for Honors students:

Honors students will write an additional 2,000 words. They will complete a project or oral presentation that shows a higher level of analytical thinking and satisfies the requirement of the honors contract

#### **Exams**

There will be three tests and a comprehensive final exam. Each is worth 100 points. They will be administered online through canvas, and will require the use of a lockdown browser. If a student misses an exam, the weight of that exam will be added to the final.

#### **In-Class Activities**

In class activities will consist of slide lectures, discussions, demonstrations, hands-on visual projects, and group work/presentations. This semester you should read the chapters and look at the Publisher's PowerPoint presentations for each before the corresponding class. We will begin wiith questions about that, then I will provide supplemental materials to support the concepts.

<u>Group Presentation</u>: Students will be divided into groups to work on a collaborative presentation which will be submitted.

<u>Projects</u>: There will be two hands-on projects, one of which is created as part of the group project, but is graded independently for each student.

#### **Final Exam**

The final is comprehensive, but it does not have a higher point value that the other tests (100 points). All students should plan to take the final exam, and should bring a scantron.

#### **Grading Formula**

These are the assignments, tests, and essays I expect that the class will complete, along with their corresponding point values. This list is subject to change, and the class will be told in advance of any such changes. You can keep track of your grades in the canvas gradebook.

Grades will be determined according to the specific assignments. Details will be provided in a separate handout.

Tests will be graded by a straight averaging of the student's total points from the scantron form and any test essay questions: student's points / total possible points = % grade.

Essays will be graded with consideration to content, writing (spelling and grammar), and adhering to the requirements of the essay. This includes being of sufficient length.

Projects will be graded based on time and effort, creative exploration, and adhering to the requirements of the assignments.

Presentations will be graded on group participation, visual content, time and effort, quality of research, and adhering to the requirements of the assignment.

#### **Incomplete Policy:**

In order to receive a grade of Incomplete ("I"), a student must have completed **at least 85%** of the work in the course. In all cases, the instructor reserves the right to decline a student's request to receive a grade of Incomplete.

### **Syllabus Modifications**

The instructor reserves the right to modify the syllabus at any time during the semester and will promptly notify students in writing, typically by e-mail, of any such changes.

### **Instructor's Practices and Procedures**

### **Missed Assignments**

A missed assignment is counted as a zero in the student's final average, and late projects lose points (10 points for each class period they are late, and will not be accepted after 3 missed classes). However, in cases of **serious emergency**, please contact me. While I cannot compromise the integrity of the class, I can work with you to create a make-up schedule for turning in the missing work. Please understand that it may not be possible for you to pass the class if you miss a lot of class time, regardless of the reason. Work will always be accepted early.

Students who miss an exam due to emergency will have the weight of that exam added to the final. In otherwords, the final will count twice.

### **Academic Integrity**

All projects for this class should be created by the student specifically for this assignment, this semester. Work created for other classes or in previous semesters is not acceptable.

"Scholastic dishonesty" includes, but is not limited to, cheating on a test, plagiarism, and collusion.

#### **Cheating** on a test includes:

- Copying from another student's test paper;
- Using materials during a test that are not authorized by the person giving the test;
- Collaborating with another student during a test without authority;
- Knowingly using, buying, selling, stealing, transporting, or soliciting in whole or part the contents of a test that has not bee administered;
- Bribing another person to obtain a test that is to be administered.

**Plagiarism** means the appropriation of another's work and the unacknowledged incorporation of that work in one's own written work offered for credit. THIS ALSO APPLIES TO VISUAL MATERIAL.

**Collusion** means the unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing written work offered for credit.

**Violations:** Possible punishments for academic dishonesty may include a grade of "0" or "F" on the particular assignment, failure in the course, and/or recommendation for probation or dismissal from the College System. A recommendation for suspension or expulsion will be referred to the College Dean of Student Development for disciplinary disposition.

If you cheat on a test, you will receive a grade of zero for the test. Projects and essays that employ collusion or plagiarism will lose points, possibly receiving an "F" or a zero, depending on the severity of the problem. Willful cheating can also get you a zero in the entire class, and it will be reported to the administration.

#### **Attendance Procedures**

Students are expected to attend classes regularly and punctually, and on-line students are expected to be "active participants". I will be consider postings to our discussions on two SEPARATE days of the week between Monday and Friday to constitute attendance for the week (for an in-person class we would meet twice a week). While I will occasionally give you discussion prompts, my hope is that this will organically grow into a discussion of the class material directed by you - you can ask any questions you have, or answer other people's questions, and I will be answering and clarifying things based on what you post.

#### **Student Conduct**

Adult behavior is expected, and disruptive behavior will not be tolerated. While I expect and encourage you to participate in class discussions, ask questions, and express opinions, you

should do so in an appropriate manner and at an appropriate time. Students who interfere with my ability to teach the class or with fellow students' ability to learn may be removed from class. Depending on the severity and/or frequency of such disruptions, students may be administratively withdrawn from the course without refund. Please do not bring guests or children to class. (Obviously, this was written with face-to-face classes in mind. Disruptions are less likely, although not impossible on-line).

### **Instructor's Course-Specific Information (As Needed)**

<u>Disclaimer</u>: This is a college course for adults. As such, students need to understand that there may be information that they find disagreeable. Nudity and controversial subjects are not uncommon in works of art. Also, religion has inspired countless art works, and will be discussed to put the work in context. This is not meant to challenge or change your personal beliefs.

- Be prepared for and participate in class critiques, small group or class discussions
- Complete assignments through inquiry, analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information
- Express knowledge of the historical role and cultural impact of artists in society
- Effectively work on a team/collaborative project
- Exhibit knowledge of intercultural competence through engaging effectively with issues of social responsibility
- Communicate in clear, coherent, and persuasive language
- Communicate effectively by completing a minimum of 2,000 words in writing assignments and/or projects
- Differentiate between the various materials, techniques, and processes traditionally used by artists
- Compare and contrast works of art using the terminology and iconography of art
- Identify stylistic characteristics of each of the various cultures and styles included in the course syllabus
- Explain the function and significance of art within its historical and cultural contexts
- Complete a hands-on art project which demonstrates knowledge of the elements and principles of design
