Course Overview for ENGL 1302

English 1302 is an intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphasis is on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions. Core curriculum course.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs) for all ENGL Core Courses

ENGL 1302 satisfies three (3) hours of the communication requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS English Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- **Critical Thinking:** Students will demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- **Communication:** Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Personal Responsibility:** Students will demonstrate the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.
- **Teamwork:** Students will demonstrate the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.

Student Success in ENGL

As with any three-hour course, expect to spend **at least six hours per week** outside of class reading and studying the material. I will provide assignments to help you use those six hours per week wisely. Additional time will be required for written assignments. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of reading the textbook, attending class, completing assignments in Eagle Online, and participating in class discussions. There is no

short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as your guide.

Written Assignments and Essays

Students will write a minimum of 5,000 words over the course of the semester.

All English 1302 students write a diagnostic essay during the first week to confirm their placement into English 1302. The essay will not count as a grade in the course. One goal of the Houston Community College English Department is to place you in an appropriate English class where you will learn and succeed.

For all assignments: No late work accepted! No excuses! You will complete your own, original, brand-new work! Submit your work to Eagle Online/Canvas! This includes completing all assignments and quizzes. Due dates are posted on your course calendar and/or assignment page. You will always receive a hand-out that states the topic of any writing assignment and any grammatical/formatting requirements. Make sure you follow all directions listed. Points will be deducted for not following guidelines. If there is a medical emergency or extenuating circumstances preventing submission of the assignment before the deadline, please inform me immediately and I will take it into consideration.

Attendance Procedure

Regular attendance is required at Houston Community College. For HCC Online courses, students will be expected to log-in and actively participate in the class. Actively participating includes posting to the discussion boards, completing quizzes, and completing any assignments. If a student does not log-in and actively participate for two weeks, the student may be dropped from the class.

HCC class attendance policy states that a student who is absent more than 12.5% (6 hours/four class sessions) of class may be administratively dropped.

Students who have excessive absences (missed more than 6 hours) by the 12th class day will be withdrawn (W).

I cannot assign you a grade of W at the end of the semester. The W will be assigned by our computer based on your absences if you decide to withdraw (before the withdrawal date).

The State of Texas has begun to impose penalties on students who drop courses excessively. For example, if you repeat the same course more than twice, you have to pay extra tuition. Beginning in the Fall of 2007, the Texas Legislature passed a law limiting first time entering students to no more than **six** total course withdrawals **throughout** their academic career in obtaining a certificate or baccalaureate degree. There may be future penalties imposed.

If you do not withdraw before the deadline, you will receive the grade that you are making as the final grade rather than a "W." This grade (due to missing classes and missing work) will probably be an "F." Please check the HCC website to find your withdrawal date.

You should visit with your instructor, an HCC counselor, or HCC Online Student Services to learn what, if any, HCC interventions might be offered to assist you to stay in class and improve your performance. Such interventions could include tutoring, child care, financial aid, and job placement.

If you feel that you cannot complete this course, please take the time to discuss with me why you feel it is necessary to do so.
