Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to introduce the student to symbolic logic, including syllogisms, propositional and predicate logic, and logical proofs in a system of rules (Texas ACGM). It emphasizes the rules of translating language into symbols as well as the semantic and syntactic implications of the system of first-order logic, a method of reasoning ingredient to philosophy, mathematics, and computer programming (HCC Catalogue). This course stresses the HCC Core Objectives of Critical Thinking, Communication Skills, Empirical and Quantitative Literacy, and Teamwork.

- **1. Determine** the logical structure of English arguments by identifying premises and conclusions.
- **2. Understand** basic concepts in logic, such as truth functionality, validity, soundness, counter-examples, tautology, self-contradiction, logical equivalence, logical contradictoriness, and logic consistency.
- **3. Translate** English statements into propositional and/or predicate notation.
- **4. Determine** the validity of symbolic propositional or predicate arguments using such methods as direct/indirect truth tables, natural deduction, and/or the finite universe method.

Grading Components and Weights:

Three tests (100 points each) (the final test/ third midterm is not cumulative). Make up tests are available only with prior approval. This means if you miss the test and have not already cleared your absence with me in advance you will earn a "0" on the test and will not be able to make it up. I drop the lowest test score and replace it with the highest.

Homework counts for 100 points there will be approximately 20 homework assignments over the course of the semester. Homework is collect twice during the semester. The first time will be roughly halfway through the course. The second time is at the end of the course. Late homework is not accepted without prior approval or at the discretion of the instructor.

There will also be approximately 10 in class guizzes. (Homework and guizzes are graded: Credit, Half- Credit, and No Credit). Quizzes count for 100 points.

Participation counts for 50 points. (Participation means active, regular, punctual involvement in class discussions and assignments). Good participation also means that you refrain from disruptive activities such as walking around or out of class (repeatedly), various outbursts, sleeping etc. It is highly recommended that each student makes use of my office hours. During these times I can give individual attention to any concerns about grades, assignments, or difficult material. Students that make use of the office hour times generally do better in the class. In particular, they are better prepared and their commitment and interest in the class is reflected in their participation scores. In addition, completion of the assignments in an orderly thorough way also contributes to your participation score.

FINAL GRADE OF FX: Students who stop attending class and do not withdraw themselves prior to the withdrawal deadline may either be dropped by their professor for excessive absences or be assigned the final grade of "FX" at the end of the semester. Students who stop attending classes will receive a grade of "FX", compared to an earned grade of "F" which is due to poor performance. Logging into a DE course without active participation is seen as non-attending. Please note that HCC will not disperse financial aid funding for students who have never attended class.

Students who receive financial aid but fail to attend class will be reported to the Department of Education and may have to pay back their aid. A grade of "FX" is treated exactly the same as a grade of "F" in terms of GPA, probation, suspension, and satisfactory academic progress.

LATE HOMEWORK: Late homework is not accepted. If the homework assignment is turned in after class time the grade assigned is "0" at the discretion of the instructor. I do take these grades into consideration, however, when determining participation.

Attendance and Withdrawal Policy:

HCC Students are expected to attend class regularly. A daily record of absences will be maintained throughout the semester. NOTE: It is the responsibility of the student to drop, or officially withdraw from this course. Your instructor will withdraw a student if and only if provided a written request from that student. Additionally, system-wide rules affect withdrawals:

- (1) Students who repeat a course for a third, or more times, may face a significant tuition/fee increase at HCC and other Texas public colleges and universities.
- (2) The Texas Legislature passed a law limiting new students (those starting college in Fall 2007) to no more than six total course withdrawals throughout their academic career in obtaining a baccalaureate degree. There may be future penalties imposed.
- (3) No student may withdraw from a course following the set "last date to withdraw", which for Spring semester is 04/03/2018. After that date and time, a student can only be given a grade earned, or an "I" for incomplete. Incompletes must be made up by the end of the following long semester, after which they will automatically change to a grade of "F". Students receiving an "I" for a course are ineligible for graduation until the "I' has been removed from a student's transcript.
