

Course Overview

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development, thought processes, and personality. (PSYC 2301 is included in the <u>Psychology Field of Study</u>.)

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

• **Critical Thinking**: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.

- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Quantitative and Empirical Literacy**: Students will demonstrate the ability to draw conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- **Social Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Written Assignment(s)

Written Assignment: Video Documentary Notes (150 points)

You must submit a set of Documentary Notes for **120 minutes of the documentaries (online videos)** for which hyperlinks are provided in Canvas. Notes can be in bullet point or numbered format. (NO PARAGRAPHS, ESSAYS, OR NARRATIVES) The standard against which notes for each documentary will be graded is that the instructor needs to be able to tell from the notes that the student watched the entire documentary and grasped all of the concepts and factual details presented in it. The following components are needed for this assignment:

You can only submit a .doc, a .pdf, or a .jpg. If you are using a Mac, please make sure that you only submit these file extensions. I cannot read a .pages file so you will receive a zero on any assignment that is uploaded as a .pages or other Mac extension.

Exams

You will take FIVE exams worth 100 points each. The exams will have 50 multiple-choice questions worth 2 points each that cover the material in your textbook chapters. Please read your textbook and take good notes. You are responsible for the information in the textbook, even if we do not discuss it in class! Exams will be available on Eagle Online Canvas until midnight of the due date (please see the Course Calendar). You will have 80 minutes to complete each exam. All questions will appear one at a time, no backtracking allowed. Exams must be completed individually, without help from your textbook, notes, or friends. You will be able to review your exam results, but correct answers will not be provided. You may take each exam TWICE. I will keep your highest grade.

In-Class Activities

In this course, you will work individually and in teams to complete a variety of activities designed to help you explore and apply the concepts you are learning. There will be TWO graded class activities worth 25 points each for a total of 50 points total. Information on the activities will be provided in class and on EagleOnline. I expect that you will have read the chapter(s) assigned before coming to class. This is an interactive course that will include writing, researching information, and team presentations. Not all class activities will count towards a grade. However, participation in the class activities may be used to grade up to a higher grade if the total points earned are 10 points away from the higher letter grade.

Practice Final Exam

The Practice Final Exam is posted on EagleOnline Canvas. The practice final mimics the actual final. However, you can take the practice final as many times as you would like. The practice

final has 100 multiple choice questions and you will have 120 minutes to complete the test. The practice final is worth 100 points.

Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam

All students in PSYC 2301 are required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple-choice questions. All of the information you need to succeed on the exam may be found at https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources. Each question on the final exam is worth 2 points for a total of 200 points.

The exam will be administered on Canvas with these restrictions:

- a. Available only on the dates listed in the Course Calendar
- b. May not be taken early under any circumstances
- c. Time limit: 120 minutes
- d. Attempts: 1
- e. Questions shown one at a time
- f. After a question has been answered, students cannot return to it.
- g. Viewing of exam questions and submitted answers is not permitted.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Students who are absent from the final exam must discuss their absence with the instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward. You must have a doctor's note or some verifiable form of documentation of an emergency to show that you were unable to take the final exam on the date it was available.
