I hope this Welcome finds you healthy, determined, and open for a challenging semester. I say challenging because situations in our lives have moved us to a virtual/online format away from many of our comfort zones, a campus classroom, a physically present instructor, and a group of classmates around us each class period, grounding us to the course and what needs to be done. Though we are recreating these comfort zones virtually, our connections with each other are real and valuable to the learning process. To help with this endeavor, I added video and or audio instructions to all assignments and secondary resources in Modules. Because this is not a traditional class, stay motivated; keep up with deadlines. Set a regular day and time to work on the class and complete assignments. Read Announcements. They are the way I communicate with you. Checking Announcements helps you stay on task with work. You will see a new Week 1 Announcement when you gain access to the class. Read it, and post any reactions, questions, or concerns. Through my role as your instructor, I see how often you log in, how long you log in, and when you submit assignments. If I notice problems, I will email you to try to find out what is happening. However, to aid in your success, ask questions when you are not understanding.

As an additional help to students, I try to make assignments due during the week, so you are not overwhelmed during the weekend with assignments that are due, but you can submit assignments before the due date.

For this particular class, testing is done online through the Canvas system. No proctored tests.

Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis. Core curriculum course.

- 7. Include a sufficient portion of the previous text when responding to an email, or use a dash to keep the conversation flowing and to provide context. Always get permission to use other people's ideas. Never copy other people's words and present them as your ow
