QUIZZES:

There will be quizzes on each of the 16 chapters in *The American Promise* text book. Each quiz will have 5 multiple-choice questions and have a <u>15 minute time limit</u>. Each quiz is worth 5 points. You can take each quiz twice with <u>your highest score being</u> recorded. At the end of semester each student will receive a bonus of 20 points that will be posted in a separate "Bonus" column in the Grade Book. (80 + 20= 100 points)

EXAMS:

Two (2) exams: Each exam has fifty (50) multiple choice questions and a <u>seventy (70)</u> <u>minute time limit</u>. You can take each exam twice but your <u>two attempts will be averaged</u>. <u>You must wait 24 hours between attempts</u>. Therefore, if you wait until the last day to take an exam, you will not be able to take it a second time. Each exam will cover only the specific chapters in *The American Promise* book. (100 points/each)

ARTICLES:

There will be two tests covering 5 different articles from the American Perspective E-Reader Volume I. Each test will have 3 questions that you will answer with a well-written short response of one or two paragraphs in your own words that thoroughly and accurately answer the question. <u>The minimum word count for each answer is 400. If</u> you don't meet the word count, your essay will not be graded. You will have 12 hours to take each test. Your answer must be based on the articles themselves. <u>No quotes are</u> allowed. Any evidence of plagiarism will result in a zero for the test. (50 points/each)

BOOK TEST:

<u>Choose one</u> of the following books to read and be tested on: *Fires of Jubilee* by Stephen Oates <u>or *Killer Angels*</u> by Michael Shaara. The book test will be composed of two essay questions: a long one of <u>600 words</u> and a short one of <u>300 words</u>. <u>If you don't meet the</u> <u>word count, your essay will not be graded</u>. You will have <u>12 hours</u> to submit your essay responses. Your essays must be written entirely in your own words - <u>no quotes</u> from the book or other sources are allowed. Also, your essay response must be based entirely on the book and no other sources. <u>Any evidence of plagiarism will result in a</u> <u>zero for the test</u>. (100 points)

<u>IMPORTANT</u>: All quizzes, exams, essays and book tests close down completely at 11:55 p.m. on their respective deadline dates. If you attempt to take a test at 11:00 p.m. on its last day of availability, you will have <u>only 55 minutes</u> to take the test. Also, since there is a mandatory 24-hour wait period between exam attempts, <u>you must use your first attempt more than 24 hours before the exam's due date</u>. Also, you must "submit" all your tests and assignments. If you don't "submit", I don't receive it and, therefore, can't grade it.

There will be no make-ups for missed tests or assignments. There is sufficient time for students to complete each assignment and test. All assignment due dates and test dates are given at the beginning of the course. **Plan accordingly**.
