What's Exciting About This Course

The second semester of drawing course continues to develop the student's visual and technical skills in various black and white media as initiated in the first semester. In addition, color materials are introduced and utilized by applying basic color theory to drawing. A wider and more complex range of subject matter is explored for longer and more involved drawings. Technical information is introduced to increase the artistic range of the materials covered in Drawing I. This course will examine the interdependence of medium and image.

My Personal Welcome

Welcome to Drawing II—I cover the basics of drawing such as how to approach materials, techniques, and general drawing issues. Drawing is essential to my own personal studio practice, so I approach the subject in a professional manner. In addition, references to artists and great drawings throughout history shall be used to demonstrate concepts discussed in class as well as to broaden the student's visual vocabulary. I am primarily concerned with providing each student a great experience that strengthens their own way of understanding how to practice drawing.

Course Overview

ARTS 1317 (Drawing II) is a studio course exploring drawing with continued emphasis on descriptive, expressive and conceptual approaches. Students will further develop the ability to see and interpret a variety of subjects while using diverse materials and techniques. Course work will facilitate a dialogue in which students will employ critical analysis to broaden their understanding of drawing as a discipline. (ACGM).

This course builds upon the skills learned in Drawing I. Emphasis will be on further media experimentation and development of a personal style.

I cover the basics of Drawing, such as, materials, techniques, and general design issues. In addition, references to artists and artworks throughout history shall be used to demonstrate concepts discussed in class and to broaden the student's visual vocabulary and technical understanding to how Art is made.

Students are assigned a series of studio assignments that range from line, to more complex color projects. These assignments will solve design problems in a manner that is found over time and rigor. These assignments are combined for the **Portfolio** grade.

Students can follow grades in Canvas weekly.

There will be specific assignments and class sessions that will request your additional personal media.
