



Course Overview

<u>ECON 2301 – Principles of Macroeconomics</u> presents an analysis of the economy as a whole including measurement and determination of Aggregate Demand and Aggregate Supply, national income, inflation, and unemployment. Other topics include international trade, economic growth, business cycles, and fiscal policy and monetary policy. This is a core curriculum course.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

ECON 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum and addresses the following core objectives which will be evaluated in this course through exams, homework assignments or written work.

- 1. <u>Critical Thinking Skills</u> (CT): To include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- 2. <u>Communication Skills</u> (COM): To include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- 3. <u>Empirical and Quantitative Skills</u> (EQS): To include the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.
- 4. <u>Social Responsibility</u> (SR): To include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national and global communities.

Upon completion of ECON 2301, the student will be able to:

- 1. Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision-making.
- 2. Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
- 3. Define and measure Gross Domestic Product and national income and rates of unemployment and inflation
- 4. Identify the phases of the business cycle and the problems caused by cyclical fluctuations in the market economy
- 5. Define money and the money supply; describe the process of money creation by the banking system and the role of the central bank.
- 6. Construct the aggregate demand and aggregate supply model of the macro economy and use it to illustrate macroeconomic problems and potential monetary and fiscal policy solutions.
- 7. Explain the mechanics and institutions of international trade and their impact on the macro economy.
- 8. Define economic growth and identify sources of economic growth.

Missed Assignments

Attendance Procedures

If a student does not attend class by the Official Day of Record, they will be dropped automatically for non-attendance.

You may be dropped from a course after accumulating absences in excess of 12.5 percent of the total hours of instruction (lecture and lab). For example: For a 3 credit-hour lecture class meeting 3 hours per week (48 hours of instruction), you can be dropped after 6 hours of absence. Administrative drops are at the discretion of the instructor.

Failure to withdraw officially can result in a grade of "F" (or "Fx" if you stop attending classes or logging in and completing assigned work for online classes) in the course.

If a student is dropped for non-attendance in the first 2 weeks of the semester, your instructor _____ may reinstate the student; ____ will not reinstate the student.
