

Course Overview

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development, thought processes, and personality.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- **Critical Thinking**: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Quantitative and Empirical Literacy**: Students will demonstrate the ability to draw conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- **Social Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

- 2. Choose an article that corresponds to one of the topics listed below.
- 3. Write a 250-word summary of the article (one page double-spaced).
- 4. Include the title of the article in your summary.
- 5. Attach a print-out of the article to your summary.
- 6. Repeat steps 1-5 for your second article summary, but you must select a different

topic in Step 2.

Exams

There will be five, 50-question multiple choice exams, one for each unit of instruction. Each question will count two (2) points. Questions on the exams will address all aspects of development, both the detailed information in the reading assignments and the major concepts and theories in the lectures. In other words, the exams cover all of the required reading even though the in-class lectures do not. No makeup exams will be allowed, but each student's lowest exam grade will be dropped prior to calculating course grades. See the schedule below for exam dates. Extra Credit

The only extra credit offered in this course is for participation. During each class session, I will award up to 1 point of extra credit to each student who attends and (a) asks a question, (b) answers a question posed by me or another student, or (c) makes a substantive contribution to the class discussion that is based on the textbook. I will award 4 points to all students who participate in the EGLS3 evaluation process. More detailed instructions will be provided later in the semester. **The maximum extra credit is 20 points**.

Practice Final Exam

There will be a 100-question practice final exam administered in class that will count for **100 points**. The exam will be administered on the date shown in the Course Calendar. Students are responsible for providing Scantron forms. Makeup exams will be considered on a case-by-case basis (see "Missed Assignments" below).

Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam

All students will be required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple- choice questions. All the information students need to prepare for the exam is in the https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources. The exam will be administered in class on the date shown in the Course Calendar. Students must provide their own Scantron forms (FORM NUMBER 882-E-LOVAS). The final exam *may not be taken early under any circumstances*. The final exam is worth 200 points.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Missed Assignments

Since the lowest exam grade will be dropped, there will be no makeups for exams. For late assignments, 5 points will be deducted each day the assignment is late (maximum 25 points deducted). Late assignments will not be accepted 5 days after the due date.
