

Course Overview

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development, thought processes, and personality. (PSYC 2301 is included in the Psychology Field of Study.)

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

PSYC 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS Psychology Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

- Critical Thinking: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication by completing a written assignment such as a book report, research paper, or essay.
- Quantitative and Empirical Literacy: Students will demonstrate the ability to draw
 conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment,
 and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing
 assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- Social Responsibility: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

Written Assignment(s)

Discussion Question Written Assignments: Students will complete 11 discussion question assignments in this course. Each discussion question will pertain to specific content information in the course except for the first discussion question which is an "introduce yourself" discussion post.

Discussion Requirements

Your posts in the discussion areas should exhibit careful thought and logical reasoning with evidence from the posted video to support your answer. Each post must be a minimum of 100 words in one to two well developed paragraphs. The discussions and a minimum of one reply to other student's posts must be completed by the due date on the course calendar.

Replying to Other Students' Posts

You are required to read and reply to other students, as indicated in each discussion requirement. Your ideas should offer new substantiated ideas or thoughtful questions.

I encourage friendly debate and disagreement, but ask that it be courteous and respectful. Do not be afraid to speak your mind, but remember that yours is only one opinion.

Grading

Each discussion post is worth 20 points. The number of points you can earn is determined as follows. There are eleven discussion questions in this course for a total of 220 points (22%) towards the final grade for the course. 5 points- Logical Reasoning and Evidence 5 points- Spelling and grammar

5 points- Length of post (minimum 100 words)

5 points- Replies to another students' post

Please view the "discussion post" rubric located in the resources module in Canvas for detailed grading based on the above points.

Discussion Questions will be graded within 36 hours prior to the turn in date for the assignment.

Discussion Board Guidelines

These guidelines will help ensure that you have a good Discussion Board experience and make the best grade possible:

- 1. You may access my feedback on your discussion grade by clicking on "Grades" and then clicking the assignment.
- 2. In order to see other students' posts, you must first submit your initial post to each forum. This encourages each student to fully engage with the assignment and provide original thoughts while prohibiting students from merely rehashing what other students have already posted.
- 3. Copying text without proper documentation from any source, including the textbook, will be considered plagiarism. Therefore, do not copy and paste any information into the Discussion Board.
- 4. With that said, short quotes from the video to support your stance is fine.
- 5. Make certain replies to classmates are new thoughts. Saying "good job" or "I agree" and summarizing what a classmate has posted does not meet the discussion board qualifications for replies to classmates.
- 6. Due to the interactive nature of the discussion board, there is no makeup work for discussion forums.

Movie Review Paper Written Assignment Movie Paper Instructions

Pick a movie that portrays a character who is/are experiencing a psychological disorder/mental illness. Alternatively, pick a movie that portrays an example of a certain type of therapy. Watch the movie and then do the following:

- 1. Write a summary of the movie. Give clear evidence that you watched it.
- 2. Write a description of how the psychological disorder or therapy was portrayed in the movie.
- 3. Write a critical analysis of how accurate or inaccurate you found the portrayal of the disorder or therapy. Show evidence of your knowledge of the psychological disorder, mental illness or the type of therapy (include information from the textbook or other sources).
- 4. All sources must be cited. Movie Paper Guidelines

Your paper should be 2-3 pages in length, 12-point font and double spaced in APA format in a minimum of 800 words. To access how to write and submit in paper in APA format, go to the "movie paper written assignment" module in Canvas. To submit your paper, use the Movie Paper submission link in the "movie review written paper" module in Canvas. The rubric for this assignment is located in the "movie review module" in Canvas. This assignment is worth 50 points (5%) of the final grade in this course.

The due date for this assignment is **Tuesday November 24th by 11:59 p.m.** Assignments may be submitted before the due date, NO ASSIGNMENTS will be accepted past the due date.

Exams

There are four exams in this course. Each exam will cover 2-3 chapters of content information in the course. All exams will be taken online in Canvas. Students will be required

to close all other open browsers while they are taking the exam. Students will have 70 minutes to complete the exam once they start. All four exams will be 50 multiple choice questions. Each multiple choice question is worth 2 points each for a total of 100 points for each exam. The total points for all four exams in this course is 400 points.

Exam One: Chapter 1,2 and 3
Exam Two: Chapter 6 and 7
Exam Three: Chapter 9 and 12
Exam Four: Chapter 15, 16 and 17

In-Class Activities

During class time, students will engage in individual or group activities based on content area requirements. Students should have printed out or have online access to the "chapter notes outline" located in the weekly modules during class instruction scheduled time class periods. It is a suggestion during class time to complete notes based on these content area domain guidelines. The note outlines will help students build their study guides for quizzes, exams and the comprehensive final exam in this course.

Other Assignments and Activities

Academic Integrity Pledge: Students are required to complete the academic integrity pledge quiz in the "Start Here" module. This quiz is worth 30 points (3%) of the final grade in this course.

Chapter Quizzes: Students will have 10 multiple choice chapter exam quizzes in this course. All quizzes will be taken online in Canvas. Students have two attempts for each quiz, the recorded grade will be the highest score earned for each quiz. Students will have 20-40 minutes to complete each quiz, depending on the number of questions in the quiz. Each chapter quiz is worth 10 points each. The point(s) per each multiple choice question on the quizzes will vary from 0.5-1.0 point each based on the number of questions on the quiz. The total points of all quizzes is 100 points (10%) of the final grade in this course.

Final Exam Review

Final Exam Chapter Notes Packet: As mentioned in the "In-class activities" section above, for each chapter covered within this course, there is a chapter note guide outline posted in the weekly modules. Students should take notes pertaining to these chapter notes guideline domain. As we progress through the course, taking these notes based on these guidelines will build your final exam review. At the end of the course, students have the opportunity to turn in these chapter notes for extra credit in Canvas. Each chapter with notes completed based on the guidelines provided, will earn 2 points of extra credit. There are ten chapters covered in this course. A student has the opportunity to earn a total of 20 extra credit points in completion of all ten chapters. Students may handwrite or type their notes based on the information provided in the King textbook. The turn in link for this extra credit assignment is provided in the final exam review module.

Practice Final Exam: Students will have the opportunity to complete a practice final exam in Canvas before the comprehensive final exam for this course. Students who complete the practice final exam will earn 5 points of extra credit in the course.

Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam

All students in PSYC 2301 are required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple-choice questions. The exam tests your knowledge and comprehension of the objectives and key terms listed in the Final Exam Handbook. The comprehensive final exam is worth 200 (20%) points of the final grade in this course.

The exam will be administered online with these restrictions:

- a. Available only on the dates listed in the Course Calendar
- b. May not be taken early under any circumstances
- c. Time limit: 120 minutes
- d. Attempts: 1
- e. Questions shown one at a time
- f. After a question has been answered, students cannot return to it.
- g. Viewing of exam guestions and submitted answers is not permitted.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Students who are absent from the final exam must discuss their absence with the instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward.

Instructor's Practices and Procedures

Missed Assignments

Students who do not complete assignments by the due date will receive a zero on the assignment in Canvas. If you have technical issues in completing or turning in a discussion, quiz or exam in Canvas, I must be notified within 24 hours of the due date for the assignment, preferably through the Canvas inbox. I will evaluate missed assignments on a case to case basis. If you are provided with the opportunity to complete an assignment past the due date, there will be an automatic deduction of 20% in the grade earned for that assignment.

Academic Integrity

Students are responsible for conducting themselves with honor and integrity in fulfilling course requirements. Penalties and/or disciplinary proceedings may be initiated by college district officials against a student accused of scholastic dishonesty.
