

#### **Course Overview**

PSYC 2301 is a survey course of the basic principles underlying human behavior. Emphasis is placed on major areas of study in the field of psychology, such as motivation, development, thought processes, and personality.

- **Quantitative and Empirical Literacy**: Students will demonstrate the ability to draw conclusions based on the systematic analysis of topics using observation, experiment, and/or numerical skills by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.
- Social Responsibility: Students will demonstrate cultural self-awareness, intercultural competency, civil knowledge, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities by completing textbook reading assignments, completing assignments, and answering questions on quizzes and exams.

# **Written Assignment(s)**

A Written assignment is required and will count as 15% of your grade. There will be one (1) separate written essay; The essay will be worth 150 points out of 1000 points. The essay will address the application and analysis of the material discussed in class.

Written assignments should be in APA Style with a maximum of 5 pages, not including the cover sheet.

# **Written Assignment Article Summary**

The purpose of this assignment is for you to spend time examining information in the field of psychology. You are to choose an interesting and applicable article and write a maximum 5 -page summary of the article, plus a cover sheet. The article may be from the internet, a journal, or a magazine.

In this summary, you are to answer the following questions. **USE EACH QUESTION AS A HEADING FOR YOUR ANSWER.** 

- √ Why did you choose this article?
- √ What is the article about?
- √ How is this article relevant to Introductory Psychology?
- √ What did you learn that is meaningful to you?

### Specifics of the Written Assignment:

- $\checkmark$  Paper is to be a maximum of 5 pages plus the cover page. No handwritten summaries will be accepted.
- √ Use 1 inch margins all around.
- √ Use 12 pt. font.
- $\checkmark$  Cover page must be included and contain your name, class, title of paper and the URL of article.
- ✓ Upload your article to Turnitin. No paper will be accepted without the article.
- √ Use paragraph breaks, proper grammar, correct spelling, and a formal writing style.
- ✓ Use each of the above questions as a heading.
- √ This written assignment must be typed and checked for grammatical, syntax, and spelling errors. In order to avoid a zero for this assignment, make sure that no portion of your summary is plagiarized and that all instructions are followed. # Exams

There will be "50 multiple-choice questions" on each of the four scheduled exams which you will take online. Each question will count 2 points for a total of 100 points for each exam, and 400 points or 40% of total grade. (See the Course Calendar within this document for the specific dates)

#### **In-Class Activities**

In-Class activities will not be graded, however, the degree of your class participation, timely completion of your assignments, and on-time class attendance will be noted when tallying your final grade. For example an "890 points" might become "900 points". Your active participation in class discussions will be noted.

# **Other Assignments and Activities**

There will be a quiz at the end of each chapter with "multiple-choice questions" which you will take online. There are 10 quizzes with 25 questions and will be worth 1 point each.

Completed quizzes will count as 25% or 250 points total grade. This will help you study more effectively and get better grades. You will also use LearnSmart to complete weekly activities with can be found in Connect online.

#### **Practice Final Exam**

All students will take a Practice Final Exam. The practice final will consist of 100 multiplechoice questions. We will review practice exam in class prior to final exam week.

# **Comprehensive Departmental Final Exam**

All students will be required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam consisting of 100 multiple- choice questions. All the information students need to prepare for the exam is in the <a href="https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources">https://learning.hccs.edu/programs/psychology/psyc-2301-departmental-final-exam-preparation-resources</a>. The exam will be administered in class on the date shown in the Course Calendar. Students must provide their own Scantron forms (FORM NUMBER 882-E-LOVAS). The final exam <a href="may not be taken early under any circumstances">may not be taken early under any circumstances</a>. The final exam is 20% or 200 points of your grade.

Students must correctly answer at least 50 of the 100 questions on the final exam (50%) to pass the course.

Students who are absent from the final exam must discuss their absence with the instructor in advance or within 24 hours afterward. Students will automatically receive a zero for missed exams without prior notification to professor.
