A.15 Prerequisites	PSYC 2301 requires college-level reading and writing skills. Research indicates that you are most ikely to succeed if you have already taken and passed ENGL 1301. The minimum requirements for parollment in PSYC 2301 include placement in college-level reading (or take INRW 0420 or ESOL 0360 as a co-requisite). If you have enrolled in this course without having satisfied these prerequisites, you are at higher risk of failure or withdrawal than students who have done so, and you should carefully read and consider the repeater policy in the HCC Student Handbook.

D. Exams, Assignments, and Grading Information

D.1 Exams

There will be "50 multiple-choice questions" on each of the four scheduled exams which you will take online. Each question will count 2 points for a total of 100 points for each exam, and 400 points or 40% of total grade. (See the Course Calendar within this document for the specific dates).

D.2 Written Assignment(s)

A Written assignment is required and will count as 10% of your grade. There will be one (1) separate written essay; Each essay will be worth 100 points out of a 1000 points. The essays will address the application and analysis of the material discussed in class. Written assignments should be in APA Style with a maximum of 5 pages, not including the cover sheet.

Written Assignment Article Summary

The purpose of this assignment is for you to spend time examining information in the field of psychology. You are to choose an interesting and applicable article and write a maximum two-page summary of the article, plus a cover sheet. The article may be from the internet, a journal, or a magazine.

In this summary, you are to answer the following questions. USE EACH QUESTION AS A HEADING FOR YOUR ANSWER.

Specifics of the Written Assignment: ✓ Paper is to be a maximum of 5 pages plus the cover page. No handwritten summaries will be accepted. ✓ Use 1 inch margins all around. ✓ Use 12 pt. font. ✓ Cover page must be included and contain your name, class, title of paper. ✓ Upload your article to Turnitin. No paper will be accepted without the article. ✓ Use paragraph breaks, proper grammar, correct spelling, and a formal writing style. ✓ Use each of the above questions as a heading. ✓ All written assignments must be typed and checked for grammatical, syntax, a spelling errors.
