Expository Essay: Research Report

When you write an Expository essay, you normally write *to inform*. That is your assignment for the next essay--*to inform* your audience about something important to you.

For example, Susan Wilcox, author of "Marathons for Women" (file on on Learning Web) is a runner who turned a subject personally important to her into a fully documented academic paper of general interest. Write a similar **factual** report based on a serious topic from your major or on a subject you would like more people to know about.

Narrow your subject to a specific claim you can explore in a minimum of two pages. Use a minimum of one trustworthy source--you cannot use Wikipedia at all--and document it correctly.
