Course Description:

This course, an introduction to Art through painting, fosters an appreciation for painting and develops critical and observational skills necessary for the creation, analysis, and interpretation of painted artworks. Through lecture, studio experience, and critique, students will examine the historical and contemporary significance of painting. Students will create paintings and learn various approaches, styles, techniques and media associated with painting, as well as Elements and Principles of Design.

Critique Dates: Critique dates are the due dates of all projects. It is imperative that your work be completed and ready for the class critique. Your participation in the critique is mandatory. The Fine Arts Department philosophy is that verbal discussion enhances the student's awareness of art concepts and his/her growth and direction.

Instructional Methods

Methods of instruction may include lecture, media/video/film presentations, media and technique demonstration, studio work time, in-class critiques, readings (from textbooks, peer-reviewed articles, books, original source seminal texts). Class time may include demonstrations, field trips, assignments, introductions, studio time for projects, and critiques.

Student Assignments

Assignments/Activities may include: individual creative projects, written critical responses, group projects, critiques, exams or quizzes, hands-on studio workdays/times, occasional gallery visits, various assigned readings from textbooks, peer-reviewed articles, books, original source seminal texts; mandatory discussions based on various topics related to the major areas of study in Art and Design; writing papers including critiques, essays, analyses, reviews, research, comparing and contrasting artistic or design theories and perspectives; service learning projects; presentations; group and/or individual projects; portfolios. This course requires a minimum of 1000 words in a combination of writing assignments and/or projects.

Methods of Assessment/Evaluation may include: portfolios, creative projects,

sketchbooks, tests and quizzes which may include: definitions, matching, multiple choice, true/false, short answer, brief essay, essay, lists; writing assignments, in-class discussions and/or critiques; written papers including critiques, essays, analyses, reviews, research, comparing and contrasting artistic or design theories and perspectives; service learning projects; presentations; group and/or individual projects; other methods as may be determined by individual instructors.

Attendance: <u>a student may be dropped</u> when their absence exceeds <u>12 hours (4 classes) out of 96 contact hours (missing 12.5% of class contact hour)</u>

<u>Proper/official documentation will be asked for receiving excused</u> absence.

Tardy: it will be recorded as the minutes you missed, and when the minutes add up to one day, it will be counted as one day absent

Participation: Your final grade for the semester will reflect your effective use of class time. Class participation shall constitute at least 10 percent of the final course grade. In this class participation is measured based on the following criteria:

- arrive promptly
- attentive watching and listening to instructional videos
- respectful listening when I or your peers are speaking
- fully engaged in your learning without texting, checking your phone or email, or participating in other digital distractions
- work consistently
- take only occasional breaks (limit 5 min. if it is other than break time set by the instructor)
- · participate fully in the class critiques
- stay to the end of class
- clean up properly
- Preparedness=Arrive promptly with all required supplies:

It is essential that you make the commitment to purchase required supplies and have them by due date listed on the schedule

- Keep and organize copies of all materials, including the syllabus, articles, links and online resources
- Complete homework assignments
- Keep responsible studio etiquette:
 - a. Respect other class members and their working space and supplies
 - b. Demonstrate responsibility with safe use of materials
 - c. Clean up thoroughly after each work session

<u>Participation score start with 100 points</u>. If you are unable to meet the above criteria, participation points will be subtracted throughout the semester. Keep in mind you start the semester with ALL your points, so <u>don't lose them!</u> Each violation will result point deduction by <u>5 points</u> on your participation score.

However, missing critique and/ or failure to bring required supplies/ assignments/ projects will result 20 **points** deduction on your participation points.

Classroom Behavior Expectations: Be advised this is an ADULT learning environment. Disruptive behavior is not tolerated. If you are excessively disrupting another student or the class, you WILL be asked to leave. In discussion/ critique, you are asked to present your views as if working in a professional environment.

Sketchbook is used <u>for in-class visual study</u>, <u>completing homework assignment</u>, and master study.

Also, it can be used for brainstorming and developing ideas via sketches, writing short journals, collaging images, drawing, painting. Missing or unfinished assignment will result point deduction.

Master Study: Minimum size for each study is 8"x10"

Painting 1: 2 master artists
Painting 2: 3 master artists

Requirements:

- 1. Attach good quality image of Master artists' work next to your study.
- 2.Include artist name, year of work, title, medium, major art movement if applicable.
- 3. Visual analysis, historical research of master should be discussed in writing. 4. Complete visual incorporation/ application/ process in painting. Gesso the surface if paper is too thin.

These result in a reduction of <u>one full letter grade</u> from the final score. **A zero is recorded after one full class week.**

No Make-up for missing projects/ assignment allowed with few emergency exceptions.

Official HCC Attendance Policy

Students are expected to attend classes regularly. Students are responsible for material covered during their absences, and it is the student's responsibility to consult with instructors for makeup assignments. Class attendance is checked daily by instructors.

Although it is the responsibility of the student to drop a course for nonattendance, the instructor has the authority to drop a student for excessive absences.

A student may be dropped from a course for absenteeism after the student has accumulated absences in excess of 12.5 percent of the hours of instruction (including lecture and laboratory time). For example:

For a 3 credit lecture class, meeting 3 hours per week (48 hours of instruction), a student may be dropped when their absence exceeds 6 hours.

For a 3 credit lecture/lab class, meeting 6 hours per week (96 hours of instruction, a student may be dropped when their absence exceeds $\underline{12}$ hours)

Administrative drops are at the discretion of the instructor. If you are doing poorly in the class, but you have not contacted your professor to ask for

help, and you have not withdrawn by the official withdrawal date, it will result in you receiving a grade of "F" in the course

NOTE: LAST DAY FOR STUDENT/ADMINISTRATIVE DROP THIS SEMESTER:

Fall 2014 semester: Oct. 31st, 2014

Course Withdrawals-First Time Freshmen Students-Fall 2007 and Later Effective 2007, section 51.907 of the Texas Education Code applies to first-time in college freshman students who enroll in a Texas public institution of higher education in the fall semester of 2007 or thereafter. High school students currently enrolled in HCC Dual Credit and Early College are waived from this requirement until they graduate from high school.

Based on this law, HCC or any other Texas Public institution of higher education may not permit students to drop after the official day of record more than six college level credit courses for unacceptable reasons during their entire undergraduate career.

Course Withdrawals

Be sure you understand HCC policies about dropping a course. It is the student's responsibility to withdraw officially from a course and prevent an "F" from appearing on the transcript. If you feel that you cannot complete this course, you will need to withdraw from the course prior to the final date of withdrawal. Before, you withdraw from your course; please take the time to meet with the instructor to discuss why you feel it is necessary to do so. The instructor may be able to provide you with suggestions that would enable you to complete the course. Your success is very important

If you plan on withdrawing from your class, you **MUST** contact a HCC counselor or your professor prior to withdrawing (dropping) the class for approval and this must be done **PRIOR** to the withdrawal deadline to receive a "W" on your transcript. **Final withdrawal deadlines vary each semester and/or depending on class length, please visit the online registration calendars, HCC schedule of classes and catalog, any HCC Registration Office, or any HCC counselor to determine class withdrawal deadlines. *Remember to allow a 24-hour response time when communicating via email and/or telephone with a professor and/or counselor. Do not submit a request to discuss withdrawal options less than a day before the deadline.* If you do not withdraw before the deadline, you will receive the grade that you are making in the class as your final grade

Early Alert Program

To help students avoid having to drop/withdraw from any class, HCC has instituted an Early Alert process by which your professor *may* "alert" you and HCC counselors that you might fail a class because of excessive absences and/or poor academic performance. It is your responsibility to visit with your professor or a counselor to learn about what, if any, HCC interventions might be available to assist you – online tutoring, child care, financial aid, job placement, etc. – to stay in class and improve your academic performance.

Repeat Course Fee

The State of Texas encourages students to complete college without having to repeat failed classes. To increase student success, students who repeat the same course more than twice, are required to pay extra tuition. The purpose of this extra tuition fee is to encourage students to pass their courses and to graduate. Effective fall 2006, HCC will charge a higher tuition rate to students

registering the third or subsequent time for a course. If you are considering course withdrawal because you are not earning passing grades, confer with your instructor/counselor as early as possible about your study habits, reading and writing homework, test taking skills, attendance, course participation, and opportunities for tutoring or other assistance that might be available.

IP (In Progress) is given only in certain developmental courses. The student must re-enroll to receive credit. COM (Completed) is given in non-credit and continuing education courses.

FINAL GRADE OF FX: Students who stop attending class and do not withdraw themselves prior to the withdrawal deadline may either be dropped by their professor for excessive absences or be assigned the final grade of "FX" at the end of the semester. Students who stop attending classes will receive a grade of "FX", compared to an earned grade of "F" which is due to poor performance. Logging into a DE course without active participation is seen as non-attending. Please note that HCC will not disperse financial aid funding for students who have never attended class.

Students who receive financial aid but fail to attend class will be reported to the Department of Education and may have to pay back their aid. A grade of "FX" is treated exactly the same as a grade of "F" in terms of GPA, probation, suspension, and satisfactory academic progress.

To compute grade point average (GPA), divide the total grade points by the total number of semester hours attempted. The grades "IP," "COM" and "I" do not affect GPA.

Health Sciences Programs Grading Scales may differ from the approved HCC Grading Scale. For Health Sciences Programs Grading Scales, see the "Program Discipline Requirements" section of the Program's syllabi.

Instructor Grading Criteria

Homework, assignments and projects will be evaluated according to the following criteria:

- Adherence to all specific assignment guidelines/content requirements.
- · Adherence to deadlines.
- Level of technical difficulty attempted and achieved. More sophisticated work may receive higher scores.
- Creativity and Originality: Solving the assignments in an imaginative and unique way may lead to a higher score.
- Honesty: Submit your own work.

Bring assigned supplies to class.

1. Supports

2-3 watercolor papers (22"x30")

Unprimed canvas 2-3 yards

Stretcher bars

Boards (birch or Masonite)

3 sets of 14"x14" with 1" border around gessoed watercolor paper

2 sets of 14"x14" with 1" border around gessoed watercolor paper

You may make your own canvases, purchase prepared stretchers, or construct other types of supports. Options will be discussed in class in advance of projects.

2. Gesso is used to prime the canvas or paper or any surface you choose to work on. Buy this in a large quantity. It's cheaper by the gallon, and one gallon can be shared by two or three students. If you buy canvas paper you do not need this.

3. Acrylic Paint:

Daler-Rowney's System-3, Liquitex, and Golden brands are perfect for this class.

Liquitex Basics are inexpensive but contain less pigment.
