**Course Modality**

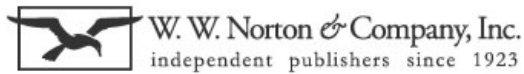

## Course Overview

ECON 2301 – Principles of Macroeconomics presents an analysis of the economy as a whole including measurement and determination of Aggregate Demand and Aggregate Supply, national income, inflation, and unemployment. Other topics include international trade, economic growth, business cycles, and fiscal policy and monetary policy. This is a core curriculum course.

### Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

ECON 2301 satisfies the social science requirement in the HCCS core curriculum and addresses the following core objectives which will be evaluated in this course through exams, homework assignments or written work.

1. Critical Thinking Skills (CT): To include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
2. Communication Skills (COM): To include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
3. Empirical and Quantitative Skills (EQS): To include the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.
4. Social Responsibility (SR): To include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national and global communities.

### Course Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs)

Upon completion of ECON 2301, the student will be able to:

1. Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision-making.
2. Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
3. Define and measure Gross Domestic Product and national income and rates of unemployment and inflation
4. Identify the phases of the business cycle and the problems caused by cyclical fluctuations in the market economy
5. Define money and the money supply; describe the process of money creation by the banking system and the role of the central bank.
6. Construct the aggregate demand and aggregate supply model of the macro economy and use it to illustrate macroeconomic problems and potential monetary and fiscal policy solutions.
7. Explain the mechanics and institutions of international trade and their impact on the macro economy.
8. Define economic growth and identify sources of economic growth.

There will be 3 exams for this class. All exams total up to a weight of 55% of the final grade. Questions will include knowledge and comprehension questions reviewing economics definitions and terminology. Questions will also include analysis, synthesis, and evaluations questions concerning theories learned. You will find a detailed description of Exams under the "Exam Details" page in Canvas. The information includes the number of questions in each exam, the type of questions, the time allowed and the dates.

All exams for this class are 100% online.

## Instructor's Practices and Procedures

### Missed Assignments

I understand that students may be working, handling personal responsibilities, taking care of others, etc. particularly in these unusual times of the pandemic/new normal so the assignment due dates are set to be at the end of the semester. This way, there are technically no missed assignments until the end of the semester.

**NOTE:** Your coursework is still scheduled to be completed on a weekly basis and my strong recommendation is that you keep up with the course calendar and turn in your work as scheduled. See the recommended course completion plan. If you do choose to work with the due date instead, there's no penalty.

Example:

Topics 1–5 are scheduled for Week 1 - 3 but the due date is Dec 8. Even though the due date is Dec 8, you should aim to complete Chapter 1-5 before taking Exam 1 on November 6 & 7. There is no penalty for not being on the schedule as long as you complete Chapters 1-5 by Dec 8.

Please note the following info:

1. **Discussions and exams due dates** are enforced and will not be extended. Late submission is not available. This means that you are required to take an exam and complete a discussion by the due date. See exceptions\*\*

It is extremely rare that Canvas and/ Norton experience a long-term technical difficulty which is rare. If this does occur, contact the technical support as I would need a technical representative to verify for me that this has been the case.

2. This class will be officially over with the final exam. The Final Exam must be taken with the class, as scheduled.
3. There will be no extensions or make-up of coursework beyond the final exam.

**I strongly suggest that you do not plan on making use of the extended submission provision** – it is usually very stressful and inconvenient to work outside of the class calendar and/cram in work to be done into a few days to taking your exams.

You are responsible for keeping up with your coursework amidst the events that occur in your life that make it difficult to meet your deadlines. You have ample time to complete your assignments so you really should not miss any submission.

**Missing work will reduce your potential final grade.**

**\*\*Exceptions for Make-up Exam:** Students with documented emergencies and regular attendance will be considered for a make-up exam. Regular attendance includes participation in discussions, timely submission of assignments and regular login to Canvas as reported by the course metrics. ### **Attendance Procedures**

If a student does not attend class by the Official Day of Record, they will be dropped automatically for non attendance.

For online students, participation (as defined by your instructor) is necessary to show attendance.

You may be dropped from a course after accumulating absences in excess of 12.5 percent of the total hours of instruction (lecture and lab). For example: For a 3 credit-hour lecture class meeting 3 hours per week (48 hours of instruction), you can be dropped after 6 hours of absence.

Administrative drops are at the discretion of the instructor.

Failure to withdraw officially can result in a grade of "F" (or "Fx" if you stop attending classes or logging in and completing assigned work for online classes) in the course.
