## **What's Exciting About This Course**

You are what's exciting about this course. This course is about understanding what it means to live in a democracy, why it works the way that it does, and how you can change it. In this class we will examine a set of issues and design solutions for moving them forward in the context of Texas politics and political culture.

# **Prerequisites and/or Co-Requisites**

GOVT 2306 requires college-level reading and writing skills. The minimum requirement for enrollment in GOVT 2306 includes concurrent enrollment in or successful completion of ENGL 1301. If you have enrolled in this course having satisfied this prerequisite, you have a higher chance of success than students who have not done so. # **Instructional Materials**

The online portions of this class will take place in Eagle Online (eagleonline.hccs.edu). Detailed instructions are in the course shell there.

### **Textbook**

McFaden, Osterman, and Teas, *Texas Government* available in the course shell. You do not need to buy an additional textbook. The course is entirely self-contained.

# **Assignments and Activities**

This class will use the RISE method (<u>risemodel.com</u>) for evaluating all student work. This method measures the level of student thinking and ability to process information. Points will be assigned based on the difficulty of the assignment on the RISE scale as follows:

- 1) **Reflect** Students will be asked to respond to different areas of the class through direct comment (usually short). Two Reflection Posts will be counted every comments section for a total of 10 points (5 points each)
- 2) **Inquire** Students will be asked to provide additional information through research and further reading both in comments and in class activities. Inquire posts must consist of a citation and a brief statement as to why that citation is relevant. Two Inquiry Posts will be counted for every comments section for a total of 20 points (10 points each)
- 3) **Suggest** Students will be evaluating other students' work. A suggestion consists of a brief selection from blog, rewriting that selection, and backing up your rewrite with a citation. One Suggestion Post will be counted for every comments section for a total of 30 points (30 points each)
- 4) **Elevate** Students will be asked to synthesize and contribute original thought to their areas of interest. ELEVATE Assignments will be reflections on the week's work using material discussed in class (further instructions will be posted online) ELEVATE blogs will be worth up to 100 points each and the final portfolio will be worth 300 points

**Source Assignment Homework** – SOURCES are similar to inquiries. Every section you will be asked to contribute 6 sources (10 points each) related to your design challenge. These sources can be snippets from the textbook or relevant articles from the internet. Like an inquiry you should add a sentence or two that summarizes and relates the main point of the source or quote to the rest of the group. These will be posted on the class blog site and added to your concept maps. These should be completed before class on the due date. Your source must be original and cannot duplicate the sources already posted.

**Web Drafts** – After each blog assignment you will be asked to add a draft section to your final portfolio website based on the blog. This will be a partially in-class assignment and each will be worth 30 points if completed.

**Argument, Concept Mapping and Review Chats** – These are synchronous meetings online or in person. Concept Mapping and Reading Review chats are designed to review sources and place them into the proper context to assist you in writing your blogs. Review chats are to review work done and plan for the Final Portfolio assignments. These sessions will be recorded and placed in the Canvas shell for those who can't make it but these are active sessions and you will get more out of them the more you engage with them.

# **Grading Criteria**

Students will be given points based on the quality of effort and the kind of assignment the student is being asked to undertake. Reflections are worth 5 points each, Inquiry, 10 points, Suggestion, 30 points, Elevate up to 250 points. Research will equal 240 points to include 6 Sources per section that meet the *Inquiry* standard above (link *and* brief explanation of relevance) Grading scale: 0-599/F, 600-699/D, 700-799/C, 800-899/B, and 900-1000/A.

#### Course Overview

**Government 2306** is one of two courses designed to introduce students to the study of the origin and development of the Texas constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas. This particular survey of the Texas state system of government includes the fundamental principles of political science, the study of the Texas state constitution, the state legislative, executive and judicial branches, local governments, methods of participation, and analysis of contemporary policies. This course is fully transferable to all Texas State colleges and universities.

## Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs)

The Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) mandates that the core curriculum must ensure that students will develop the essential knowledge and skills they need to be successful in college, in a career, in their communities, and in life. Through the Texas Core Curriculum, students will gain a foundation of knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world, develop principles of personal and social responsibility for living in a diverse world, and advance intellectual and practical skills that are essential for all learning.

Students enrolled in GOVT 2305/2306 core curriculum courses will complete assessments designed to measure the following core objectives:

- Critical Thinking Skills—to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information
- Communication Skills—to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication
- Personal Responsibility—to include the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making
- Social Responsibility—to include the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making

# Program Student Learning Outcomes (PSLOs)

- Identify and describe the institutions of the Texas government.
- Recognize and assume the responsibilities of citizenship by developing one's critical thinking skills, engaging in public discourse, and by obtaining information through the news media.

# Course Student Learning Outcomes (CSLOs)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1) Identify and describe the institutions of the State of Texas government.
- 2) Identify and evaluate information sources for political news, data, and opinion.
- 3) Analyze the effects of the historical, social, political, economic, and cultural forces on politics and government.

## **Student Success**

Expect to spend at least twice as many hours per week on your own in addition to the time you would normally spend during instruction. Additional time will be required for written assignments. The assignments provided will help you use your study hours wisely. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of the following:

- Reading the textbook
- Attending class in person and/or online
- Completing assignments
- Participating in class activities

There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as your guide.
