## **Extra Credit Opportunities**

There are several opportunities for you to view political movies or listen to guest speakers that can be counted as extra credit. Write a two-page paper analyzing the politics found in the movie or discussed by the guest speaker. Attend the event with your mind on politics. The paper grade earns up to 8 points that can be added to an exam grade of your choosing (A = 8 pts., B = 6, C = 4, D = 2). The papers are due one week after the event date if you attend an event. No late paper exceptions.

The paper is *not* a synopsis of the movie/event. The paper should analyze the politics involved with the issue or policy concern, and *apply course/book information to understanding the issue*. Consider everything we've learned thus far on how politics affects policymaking and policy choices for the country: political power, demographics, political cultures/values, international/economic environments, the three branches and other political institutions (elections, media, campaigns, etc.). Consider varying political interests from all actors involved with the issue. Think critically about political relationships between the people and government, and among government institutions. The more you apply course/book concepts, the higher the grade!
