Learning Management System

I will use the Canvas platform to present lectures and notify you of any changes to assignments or projects. This semester, there are three modalities for English courses: *online Anytime* (WW), online on A Schedule (WS), and flexCampus (FC).

FC - The course modality of this class is *flexCampus*.

Faculty will hold class as per the assigned schedule, and students will be assigned to attend in person or online each class period utilizing Canvas Eagle Online.

On the days when you are not assigned to be in person, it is expected that you will attend virtually (online).

Attendance will be taken each class period.

WS - The course modality of this class is *online on A Schedule*.

Faculty will hold class as per the assigned schedule, and students will attend online each class period utilizing Canvas Eagle Online.

Attendance will be taken each class period.

WW - The course modality of this class is *online Anytime*.

Faculty will instruct this class as a traditional online course utilizing Canvas Eagle Online.

Attendance will be taken through completion of online assignments.

Course Overview for ENGL 1302

English 1302 is an intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphasis is on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions. Core curriculum course.

Core Curriculum Objectives (CCOs) for all ENGL Core Courses

ENGL 1302 satisfies three (3) hours of the communication requirement in the HCCS core curriculum. The HCCS English Discipline Committee has specified that the course address the following core objectives:

 Critical Thinking: Students will demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.

- **Communication**: Students will demonstrate effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Personal Responsibility**: Students will demonstrate the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.
- **Teamwork**: Students will demonstrate the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.

Student Success in ENGL

As with any three-hour course, expect to spend **at least six hours per week** outside of class, reading and studying the material. I will provide assignments to help you use those six hours per week wisely. Additional time will be required for written assignments. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of reading the textbook or indicated materials, attending class, completing assignments in Eagle Online, participating in class discussions, or completing in-class activities. There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably re-reading) and studying the material using the course objectives as your guide.

Assignments

Written Assignments and Essays

Students will write a minimum of 5,000 words over the course of the semester. Your assignments will include, but are not limited to, group work, homework assignments, essays, graded and ungraded quizzes, and a research project.

Assignments must meet requirements as outlined in this document, verbally conveyed in class, and explained on assignment sheets. Essays must be typed (Times New Roman or Arial font, 12pt—black ink only), and will be formatted in accordance with **MLA** manuscript guidelines that I provide. Essays must be transmitted in a manner that maintains the proper format (doc, docx, rtf, or pdf) and uploaded to Canvas. **Assignments that do not meet requirements run the risk of getting an automatic zero.** You may not submit a paper for a grade in this class that has been submitted for a grade in another class unless I give prior permission. Make-up work and late assignments are submitted at my discretion. No extra credit, no curve.
