What's Exciting About This Course

Intermediate Chinese further develops the listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills and the cultural awareness acquired in Beginning Chinese. The skills you learn from this course will enable you to read and write with a broader range of vocabulary and engage in conversations with more words and phrases in a culturally appropriate manner.

My Personal Welcome

Hello everyone, and welcome to Beginning Chinese I. This course explores the foundational Chinese learning to assist you in Chinese real-world situations and ensuring that you have an adequate core understanding of how to write, read, listen, and speak basic Chinese. In this course, students must have access to Microsoft Word and Microsoft PowerPoint software.

The Key concepts of this course will include listening, speaking, writing, and reading of Chinese.

Our course will discuss and provide you with the opportunity to reflect on and discuss various Chinese language learning and cultural topics to experience real Chinese society, traditions, and culture.

Course Overview

CHIN 1411, Basic Chinese language skills in listening speaking, reading and writing within a cultural framework. Students will acquire the vocabulary and grammatical structures necessary to communicate and comprehend at the beginner level.

- **Critical Thinking**: Students will demonstrate the ability to engage in inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information, and creative thinking by completing an essay assignment on a topic introduced in the course readings.
- **Communication Skills**: Students will demonstrate effective expression of ideas through completion of two oral presentations and class discussion on cultural topics.

- 6. Compare and contrast the traditions, customs and values of the Chinese-speaking world with characteristics of their own culture

Learning Objectives for CHIN 1411

Students in this course will:

- 1.1 Speak in complete sentences about everyday activities using the present tense.
- 1.2 Construct dialogues in the present tense regarding daily activities
- 2.1 Respond accurately in the present tense to questions asked by others regarding self, family, and immediate surroundings.
- 2.2 Elaborate in the present tense on elements of a given conversation.

- 3.1 Write short, cohesive sentences in the present tense that describe people, situations and daily activities.
- 3.2 Narrate everyday events in a short paragraph using the present tense.
- 4.1 Read a short passage and respond accurately to questions in different modalities.
- 4.2 Restate and explain significant points from the reading.
- 5.1 Recognize and differentiate among the many aspects that characterize the target culture.
- 6.1 Compare and contrast the cultural aspects of daily life between the United States and target cultures.

Student Success

Expect to spend at least twice as many hours per week outside of class as you do in class studying the course content. Additional time will be required for written assignments so be sure to pay attention to the due dates of the assignments to allow yourself enough time to complete them. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of the following:

Chapter Tests

You will take a test at the conclusion of each class and each chapter. The tests will include the following sections: listening, grammar, reading, writing and speaking. Tests will be 15% of your total grade.

In-class Activities and participation

May participation is very important because I have in-class activities throughout the lesson. To me, if you do not participation in class, you won't learn. In-class activities will include writing, partner practice, oral drills, vocabulary practice and conversation practice on topics related to the assigned chapters in the textbook. Learning a second language requires lots of practice, and you will have an opportunity to practice what you have learned in class. You will spend an hour each week in a computer lab working individually on the online exercises that I have assigned for each chapter Your participation in all these activities will be 25% of your total grade.

Homework assignment

There will be homework for vocabulary writing, grammar, recording, and listening. Some of these will be done in the lab and other will be homework assignment. You can do it either in a computer lab on campus or at home. These assignments will be 15% of your total grade.

CHIN 1411 Departmental Final Exam

All students enrolled in CHIN 1411 will be required to take a comprehensive departmental final exam. The exam will be very similar in format to the chapter tests you have taken at the end of each chapter. The final exam will be given the last week of the semester and it will be 30% of your final grade.
